

# FROM FATHER BILL



Dear People of St Paul's,

As the year comes to a close we begin a new stewardship season. Actually we are beginning a stewardship year because this year stewardship will be different than it has ever been at St. Paul's.

At the end of this year we will have failed to meet our budget income goals for 8 of the past 11 years. To put it another way, we have met our budget only 3 out of the last 11 years. Here at St. Paul's we have been in the red most of the last decade. I don't believe this is anyone's fault, either the people who have accepted the job of heading up stewardship on our behalf or of the givers. But there is a problem in how we have long thought about stewardship and the fact that we have run deficit budgets for 8 of the past 11 years is evidence of that.

You might think I would be concerned about such losses after so many years but I am not because I know that the people of St. Paul's can support the mission and ministry of St. Paul's. For a longtime we have been engaged in fundraising, not stewardship and this is the year to begin to change that.

We will continue to establish a budget of course but rather than fundraising to support a budget we will be talking about proportional giving to support ministry.

At St. Paul's doing Christ's work in the world takes many forms and is the work of

many people. And as wonderful and historic as our church is we don't pay the upkeep, insurance, and utility bills for the sake of the building but for the sake of the work that takes place here

The idea of real stewardship rather than fundraising may take some time to understand; it is a very different way of thinking about how we give thanks to God for what we have and how we are called to think about what we give. Our pledge cards will look different as well as this year because you will be asked to pledge both money and your time.

On December 14 there will be a parish wide First Fruits Dinner. This will not mark the beginning of stewardship but the end of the first phase. You will be receiving a personal invitation soon so please mark your calendars now for that night. In the weeks to come you will be hearing more about this new approach in detail. Your Stewardship Committee will be sending out material to explain what a narrative, mission driven, proportional giving stewardship approach is about.

I ask your patience as we begin rethink what it means to support St. Paul's. As I have told the stewardship Committee, the Christian Formation Committee, the Vestry and the Finance Committee, stewardship is really about Christianformation. The work of the Church is the work of Christ and stewardship is how we do that work. More soon.

## Children's Chapel on Sunday Mornings

On Sunday mornings we offer Children's Chapel for children ages 3 years old – 5th grade age during the 8:45 am and 11:00 am services. Children go to church with their parents/grandparents/guardians. After the Collect, children process out to Founders Hall for liturgy through the lessons, prayers, and activities. Children return to the main church service at the Peace. Children's Chapel engages children through using curriculum through the Episcopal Church, Lesson Plans That Work.

These lesson plans, written by experienced church school teachers, are designed to follow the Revised Common Lectionary and use practical approaches that volunteers can follow. The lesson plans can be used as written or easily adapted when necessary. There is a need for leaders and for helpers.

### A DANCING FRANCISCAN MONKEY

"Christ has no body but yours. No hands, no feet on earth but yours. Yours are the eyes through which He looks compassion on this world. Yours are the feet with which He walks to do good. Yours are the hands through which He blesses all the world. Yours are the hands, yours are the feet, yours are the eyes, you are His body. Christ has no body on earth but yours", Teresa of Avila.

I have had several come and ask how do I become a Franciscan? There is a web site that will plug you in to a national office of sorts where information is distributed back and forth but that is a formal external commitment of something that started for me a long time ago. Every Franciscan I have talked to has said the same thing, "I was a Franciscan long before I started the formal journey".

The next question asked is, "what do y'all do?" Remembering we were Franciscans before we joined a common path, each of the five at St. Paul's have different gifts, interests and that sends us in different directions. We gather several times a week for prayer, support each other on their journey and look for ways our own gifts and interests overlap theirs. For those enquiring about the journey I suggest it's more like a pilgrimage where something happens to you that you could not make happen yourself. For me, I wanted a closer relationship with God the Father, God the Son, God the Holy Spirit.

I felt I had mined all I could from Bible study, had been faithful for years to Theology-on- Thursday, even longer discussing social justice at K-Group, a Lay Eucharistic Minister, Chalice, reader and on...All to say I had come as close to God as I could. You may have picked up the fact that I was doing all "I" could, I was calling the shots, deciding the direction. Even a child knows that if you ask for direction, you button it up and get out of the way. That was my hardest barrier to break through. All my life, I believed that if I wanted something bad enough, I could apply enough pressure, time and energy and make it happen.

Breaking this barrier was counterintuitive. The less I tried, the more the barrier started to crumble. This "Less" came in the form of prayer and meditation which is an active intentional act that too many have abandoned. Part of that barrier crumbling was moving from a position of being in the world but not of the world. The Trinity calls us to be active in the world, to use our God given gifts to serve those on the margins. But that world of hate, fear, injustice is not who we are.

"Yours are the hands, yours are the feet, yours are the eyes, you are the body". The change that occurs when you can be active in the world without the world defining who you are is the change I mentioned that occurs on a pilgrimage, a change that you did not create.

As for as a Franciscan, "This is not just what I do, this is who I am.....", Rapper-Tupac Shakur. God of Spirit and Truth, expand our minds, but even more our hearts to receive your great and universal good news. We know that no change of the heart comes without a change of mind, and no change of mind happens without a change of heart. Get Started in one place or the other. Amen, Amen.
