And that leads to the choir. The music was stunning and performed beautifully by our dedicated and talented choir. A big thank you to all who lifted their voices and sang!



Children's Chapel on Sunday Mornings



Chalice Bearers

Chalice Bearers assist the priest at the altar with serving communion. There is opportunity for Chalice Bearers at any of the services. They also can assist with special services such as weddings and funerals.

Readers/Intercessors

Readers and Intercessors have the opportunity to read the lessons and/or the *Prayers of the People* at the services.

Acolytes

The St. Paul's Acolyte Program recruits, trains and offers get-togethers for youth who wish to serve as Torch Bearers and Crucifers during St. Paul's worship services. By participating in the Acolyte Program, you join many others who help make each worship service happen by serving as ushers, choir members, readers, oblation bearers, and altar guild members.

Altar Guild

This ministry gives people the opportunity to prepare the Altar for regular services, and maintain the linens, vestments, and silver. The Altar Guild also takes part in the set up for weddings, funerals, and other services.

Lay Eucharistic Visitors

This ministry gives people the opportunity to take Holy Communion to people who for varying reasons, are unable to come to a church service to receive Holy Communion. Lay Eucharistic Visitors or LEVs take communion to parishioner's homes, assisted living facilities, and hospitals. The LEVs are sent forth from whatever service they attend, with a communion kit of blessed sacraments to take to

CONTEMPLATIVE OUTREACH OF MIDDLE TENNESSEE ELEVENTH ANNUAL GATHERING

Saturday, September 9, 2017 Franklin First United Methodist Church's Main Campus 8:30 a.m.-12:30 p.m.

Contemplative Outreach of Middle Tennessee (COMT) will host its annual Gathering on Saturday, September 9, 2017, at the Franklin First United Methodist Church's main campus. All are welcome to attend. COMT is the Middle Tennessee chapter of Contemplative Outreach Ltd., which offers programs and support for those who want to deepen their relationship with God through the practice of Centering Prayer.

This year's keynote speaker will be the Reverend Tom Ward, an Episcopal priest and longtime centering prayer practitioner and facilitator. His topic will be "Next Steps on the Journey." Ward is a retired chaplain of the University of the South who now spends his days focusing on the contemplative dimensions of the Gospel.

Many Christians are increasingly involved in daily Centering Prayer, an ancient practice that is experiencing a resurgence across major denominations. Tennessee's churches are particularly active in this area.

Rooted in the contemplative tradition, the prayer invites practitioners simply to sit in interior silence for a brief period of time, daily, attentively "consenting to God's presence and action" within them. It is practiced both privately and in small groups. In Middle Tennessee, some thirty organized centering prayer groups meet weekly. Each year, Middle Tennessee centering prayer practitioners and persons wanting to learn more come together for learning and community building.

Cost is \$20.00, which includes coffee and muffins. To learn more and to register for the event, please visit www.centeringprayermidtn.com. Registration begins at 8:00 a.m. Please note the location is the church's Main Campus, 120 Aldersgate Way, off Mack Hatcher in Franklin; not the church's historic sanctuary in downtown Franklin. (Your GPS may not recognize this.)

Contemplative Outreach Ltd. is a spiritual network of individuals and small faith communities committed to living the contemplative dimension of the Gospel. The common desire for Divine transformation, primarily expressed through a commitment to a daily Centering Prayer practice, unites our international, interdenominational community (www.contemplativeoutreach.org).

Historical Committee Update.

190th Anniversary Celebration. On Friday, August 25th, an enthusiastic group of about 70 people including 16 children gathered in Otey Hall to celebrate St. Paul's 190th anniversary. We sang happy birthday and enjoyed cake, champagne and some delicious food while we heard from Scott Smith about the early years of the parish and Melanie Lampertz, the Historic Committee Chair shared some thoughts about planning for the Bicentennial.

Father Rusty welcomed the group via video (since he had a previous engagement that kept him away) and Monna welcomed the group in person and shared some words with the attendees including these beautiful words:

- "I don't know what kind of vision the founders had, but could they have imagined that St. Paul's would serve as barracks and a hospital during a war that nearly tore our country apart; or that she would still be here through two World Wars and a Cold War; and that 190 years after she was founded, still be standing, stronger than ever as a cornerstone in a thriving community? Probably not----"
- "I'd like to think that we are not only continuing to make their grand dreams and visions reality, we are making our own grand dreams and visions reality, as well."
- "I give thanks for ALL the many past and present parishioners of St. Paul's who have, over the past 190 years, continued to change to imagine, to dream, to explore, to grow, to

create, to shape this parish into what she is today."

• "After all --- The past 190 years is truly OUR STORY --- And OUR STORY continues! Thank be to God!"

It would not have been a birthday party without a photo booth and children's games, and we had both. Everyone really enjoyed having their pictures made with our Bishop Oteythemed props!







TUESDAY MORNING CENTERING PRAYER

10:00 a.m., Barnabas (Quiet Room)

What is centering prayer? According to the Contemplative Outreach Center, it is described as "a receptive method of silent prayer that prepares us to receive the gift of contemplative prayer, prayer in which we experience God's presence within us, closer than breathing, closer than thinking, closer than consciousness itself.

This method of prayer is both a relationship with God and a discipline to foster that relationship. Centering Prayer is not meant to replace other kinds of prayer. Rather, it adds depth of meaning to all prayer and facilitates the movement from more active modes of prayer - verbal, mental or affective prayer - into a receptive prayer of resting in God. Centering Prayer emphasizes prayer as a personal relationship with God and as a movement beyond conversation with Christ to communion with Christ.

— The Gift —

Celebration of a New Ministry, William Russell "Rusty" McCown...

What an evening, old and new friends, clergy from the highest to the lowest ranks, the choir, bagpipe and drum, perfect warm late summer weather and gifts, yes gifts. These were more than just gifts, each represented a part of the body of St. Paul's. Each complete and perfect, yet made greater as a part of the greater mission of this First Church, a representation of the covenant relationship with the Creator. Each gift telling a story of something past, our present and with God's help, our future. Keys to the church presented by our Sr. and Jr. Wardens, I felt, represented the wedding rings that are exchanged to seal the union of two into one, in the presence God and the Church.

My favorite A.M. Radio Voice in the 50's was Paul Harvey. His short news program evolved into what he called, "Now for the Rest of the Story". This was a segment where he would go into great detail about a story that had only been barely mentioned. "Now for the Rest of the Story". When Monna contacted me about presenting a gift to Fr. Rusty representing St. Paul's Outreach, I was surprised, humbled, honored. I had seen preparations of some gifts, heard of what others were doing, all so creative, spot on, perfect, so thoughtful. What would represent or be symbolic of all the diverse outreach energy and programs flowing through the members to the community? It had to be creative, hands on, hand made preferable, low budget, broad in scope, small in size. I wish I had the Women's Bazaar to choose from, they always

get so much neat stuff. Maybe an old Kaleidoscope. It's small, low cost, the many colors and shapes it creates represents the diverse outreach ministries, perfect, but the Bazaar is several weeks off. There are some windows in the Library that were removed from the Rectory.

That might work! Looking through a window is how you view the community, the world around you, so outreach is how you view the community, the world around you.

Symbolism works well, low cost, part of something original but too dang big to carry down the aisle and present. Besides, where would you put it during the rest of the presentations? Good idea, loaded with symbolism, not practical. How about a plumb line? Could be made small, hands on, inexpensive (maybe), loaded with symbolism, generic in scope, specific in function. That defines the perfect outreach program. A plumb line is one of the oldest tools used in construction. It helps one build strong, long lasting structures, beautiful to behold, functional and serves the community, the perfect tool. That says a lot about outreach and outreach says a lot about the organization and the individuals that make up the body, the foundation. It defines what is important and how you respond to your relationship to and with God. I like where this is going! I contacted Len Reinhardt to build a small mount or hanger for the plumb line. He is such a master with wood. I had a spool of waxed string I had found on the side of the road during my old biking days. So far, it was creative, hands on, low cost, broad in scope but what about the actual weight that produces the perfect vertical nature of the tool?

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That's usually brass or something similar. When the Bell Tower was reinforced a year ago, a lot of original flooring and supports were removed. I went rooting around in the dirt around the renovation and found several square rusty nails I feel are original or surely could be.

That would be a perfect weight for the plumb line. That would complete the plumb line gift. Almost like a wedding gift, something Old (the rusty nail), something New (the hanger), something Found (the waxed string), something Blue. Well, three out of four ain't bad. As Fr. Rusty would say, if we were playing baseball, that percentage would get you into the Hall of Fame. This gift, all these gifts that Fr. Rusty received are like wedding gifts. He is joining St.Paul's family and will be sharing his gifts with us. St. Paul's is small in size, large in outreach, an intricate part of God's community and the fabric of Franklin, our mission and covenant.

WEDDING AT CANA TAKES THE CAKE

This article was first written for Episcopal Relief & Development's Network News, the national newsletter for network coordinators across the country. It is about the most recent Wedding at Cana, held at St. Paul's Franklin in May, and the tremendous generosity of our congregation, not only to the 2017 event, but the past nine years.

The 9th Annual St. Paul's Wedding at Cana was held on Saturday, May 6th, 2017 at St. Paul's Church in Franklin, Tennessee. At our Wedding, instead of turning water into wine, as in Jesus' first miracle, this event helps turn wine into water.

St. Paul's Wedding at Cana raises funds for the Clean Water Initiative of Episcopal Relief and Development. The Clean Water

Initiative ensures the placement of wells and other technologies in developingworld villages without current access to clean water.

The world- awaits 2017 Cana guests wide need for clean drinking water is more urgent now than at any time in history; every drop is vital, and for nine years the people of

St. Paul's have been engaged in the important ministry of increasing water's availability to those who need it most.

The positive economic and health impact of such access is profound, and following the first Cana in 2009, Episcopal Relief & Development acknowledged St. Paul's event on our website, and has encouraged its adoption in congregations across the country.

The first two Cana raised events \$750, and \$800, respectively, but due to a format change (a direct result of brainstorming with fellow coordinators at our Network Meeting in Belize), the Cana events from 2011-2016 each raised the \$5,000 necessary to place an entire well. In 2017, due to a large matching donation from a single anonymous

donor, the St. Paul's Wedding at Cana for the first time forwarded a check for \$10,000, sufficient to place TWO wells!

In other words, not counting other individual and committee donations, over the past nine years this single congregation has forwarded over \$41,500 to Episcopal Relief & Development, purchasing eight entire wells, and shares in two more.

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
