



150th Anniversary Celebration of Reconsecration of St. Paul's

The red-letter dates of the history of St Paul's Episcopal Church are fairly well-known; however, we actually have many small but momentous dates that are of great importance as well. One of those almost got by without notice; however, thanks to Mark Hyssong, we are pleased to inform you that a significant anniversary was recently observed: The sesquicentennial of the re-consecration of St. Paul's! On January 25th, 1871, Right Reverend Charles Todd Quintard, the second Bishop of Tennessee, conducted the service to re-open St. Paul's. Rev. Bradley, who had come to Franklin in 1869 to examine the post-War church in deplorable condition and subsequently went all over the nation soliciting funds to finance the remodeling of the sacred space, was the priest-in-charge. A large assemblage gathered to attend this service and to see the church which by now had a much different look than when originally built. The former slave gallery was removed which eliminated the entire upper floor (the bricks were recycled into building used then as a rectory which today is known as Founder's Hall). It must have been a happy day for the small parish to see the church secured for future use and this is still the basic church that is St. Paul's still today. We are eternally grateful to all the men and women who have labored for two centuries to allow us to inherit the historical gem that is St. Paul's, Franklin.



Ash Wednesday Services, 2/17/21

Wednesday Feb 17 is Ash Wednesday, marking the beginning of the Season of Lent, a penitential time in the church. Ashes are an ancient sign of penitence. From the Middle Ages it became the custom to begin Lent (the forty days before Easter) by being marked in ash with the sign of the cross. The reminder that we are dust turns our attention to the creative power of God, and God's ability to heal the brokenness in our lives when we offer that brokenness to God. That turning to God is the work of Lent, preparation for the celebration of Jesus's resurrection on Easter Day. On Ash Wednesday, St. Paul's is offering 3 times for you to join with the community of faith in receiving the imposition of ashes. Please consider one of these opportunities to enter into the Holy Season of Lent:

Hooray for Godly Play! Sundays at 10:00 am






Kairos



Stephen Ministry

Our current environment has brought emotional changes to all of us. Our lives have been changed by COVID-19, and it may be a while before we return to anything close to what we were used to before the pandemic. Stephen Ministry does not have the visibility and access to the community and Church family because of the current situation, which makes it more difficult to identify people who need someone to listen to their concerns and help them through their crisis. Parishioners in general, have not been as active outside their own immediate family or work environment as perhaps they were, which makes it more difficult for them to know about people who need a Stephen Minister. Yet there are people who are struggling through the isolation and the new "normal". **Stephen Ministry is alive and active at St. Paul's.** We are constantly trying to reach out to individuals who might feel lonely, frustrated or depressed do to the isolation this pandemic has created. To the good people of St. Paul's parish, Franklin:

The Historic Committee of St. Paul's would like to extend an invitation to the communicants of our church. In these unprecedented times; moreover, these are historic times. It is important that this epoch is recorded on every level, including that of our own church family. Please begin a journal regarding your experiences of late. Include your daily activities, news, as well as your thoughts and feelings about these never-before-seen events. There are no rules: you can be as verbose or as filtered as you wish. You can express it in poetry, with humor, whatever you prefer. The idea is to capture what you are doing and how you are reacting and especially on a spiritual level. This will allow you to express yourself, keep yourself from getting bored, and, best of all, it will record this moment for future generations who will likely find this all very interesting—just as the interest of the history of the Spanish influenza epidemic of 1918 has been rekindled now—100 years later.

When it comes to writing your journal entries, consider the following questions:

How has your daily routine changed as a result of the pandemic?

Did you have to stay home to care for your children? Did your place of business close?

Were you able to work from home? Did you still get paid during this time?

Did social distancing change your shopping habits – the frequency or what you bought?

How did you explain this to your children? Did anyone you know get sick?

Did you have to convince your parents or another family member to isolate?

How did you cope with the potential of getting the virus?

How are you altering your habits, work life, and living arrangements to cope with the larger pandemic and our local shelter-in-place order?

You can also describe your thoughts on the pandemic, including how you feel about it, and your observations of what's happening in society around us. If you've got children at home, you can encourage them to document their thoughts and experiences as well or even create a shared family journal, as children are chronically underrepresented in the historical record.
