

## **A Letter from the Rector:**

March 23, 2021

Dear Sisters and Brothers of St. Paul's-

I hope and pray that this Lenten season finds you well and safe during this strange and difficult time we live in. I want to spend a couple of moments to address the upcoming few months and how I see the possible "reopening" of our church.

I think we are all very optimistic about the future as it pertains to the COVID virus. Over the past number of weeks, we have seen a sharp decline in active cases as well as an increase in vaccinations. Adding these two elements together has given us a reason to feel very hopeful about many things in our community, and that includes getting our church selves back to normal.

However, I think we need to be patient and not react too quickly to this good news. I am concerned that opening the community too fast, coupled with Spring Break, could have an adverse reaction to the strides we have made. I will be closely watching the active case numbers during this time. Hopefully, they will level out or even go down. Once I see that, then I think the church will have a three-prong opening in the following manner:

- Opening the sanctuary. As you may know, I felt compelled to temporarily close the sanctuary during the rapid increase in COVID cases during the winter, especially given the fact that visitors to the church were not, to some degree, adhering to our COVID policies. I believe opening the sanctuary will be our first step.
- Group meetings. As long as all members of a group are vaccinated, then we will allow committees and such to again meet on the church grounds. But the rule needs to be for all groups, not just a select few. This will probably be the second step.
- Worship. This is what our folks are most concerned about. Once we have assurance that our worship services will be a safe place for all, then we can have these events with restrictions.

When will this happen? I can't say for sure, but I am cautiously optimistic that we can begin reopening by early summer and be fully engaged by mid-summer. Please don't hold me to this. It's just something I think about all day, every day.

Until then, we will continue our current procedures. But I think we can see the light at the end of the tunnel. Personally, I can't wait for us to all gather together as a whole church family once again. Until then (hopefully very soon), may you have a holy Eastertide and may God bless you and your family.

## **Holy Week Worship Opportunities**

#### **In-Person Stations of the Cross**

Stations of the Cross are images that represent the stages of Christ's passion and death. St. Paul's has 14 icons on the walls inside the sanctuary. Particularly on Good Friday, walking to each station in order, and offering prayers at each one, can serve as a spiritual pilgrimage through contemplation of the Passion of Christ.

On Good Friday, April 2 – any time from 9:00 am – 11:30 am and 1:00 pm – 3:00 pm, you are invited to walk the Stations of the Cross (self-guided) in the sanctuary, or to come and sit for meditation. There will be booklets for Stations of the Cross available inside the church. Note, there is a Good Friday Service at Noon, which you can sign up for by going to our website or by calling the church office.

Please wear a mask and maintain social distance from others while in the church.

#### **Lenten Lessons and Carols**

Lessons and Carols, traditionally done during Advent or Christmas, is a powerful service of scripture readings and music, focused on the telling of a biblical story. It is one of the oldest services in the Anglican tradition. The Adult Choir, Consort, and HAndbell Choir of St. Paul's have used this format to create a virtual Lenten Lessons and Carols for you to experinece during Holy Week. It begins with the Palm Sunday scripture and end with Christ's death. We offer this service in anticipation of the Easter Vigil and Easter Morning liturgy. The Upper Room was a place where Jesus gathered with his disciples. Before his death, it was a place where he washed their feet, served them a supper, and shared his innermost thoughts with them. After his death, it was a place where his disciples continued to gather, out of safety, but also out of comfort. After his resurrection, he appeared to them in the Upper Room offering that peace and comfort they longed for.

At St. Paul's, we continue to follow CDC guidelines of staying safe in this Pandemic, which means we cannot all gather together in a Room, but we can gather together on a Zoom. We can gather in Upper Zooms – in small groups where God's presence among us has the power to transform lives. When we learn together, share our stories with one another, explore scripture and ask questions, pray for each other, or laugh and find joy together, God is at work.

This will allow you to express yourself, keep yourself from getting bored, and, best of all, it will record this moment for future generations who will likely find this all very interesting—just as the interest of the history of the Spanish influenza epidemic of 1918 has been rekindled now—100 years later.

#### When it comes to writing your journal entries, consider the following questions:

How has your daily routine changed as a result of the pandemic?

Did you have to stay home to care for your children? Did your place of business close?

Were you able to work from home? Did you still get paid during this time?

Did social distancing change your shopping habits - the frequency or what you bought?

How did you explain this to your children? Did anyone you know get sick?

Did you have to convince your parents or another family member to isolate?

How did you cope with the potential of getting the virus?

How are you altering your habits, work life, and living arrangements to cope with the larger pandemic and our local shelter-in-place order?

You can also describe your thoughts on the pandemic, including how you feel about it, and your observations of what's happening in society around us. If you've got children at home, you can encourage them to document their thoughts and experiences as well or even create a shared family journal, as children are chronically underrepresented in the historical record.
