The time has come to refresh and reimagine our physical spaces and, in so doing, to refresh our souls and reimagine our life together. Our theme, Reviving our Building, Transforming our Lives, reflects our purpose.

The projects include:

- Education, Formation and Administration Center (with flexible meeting space, a new nursery, and better office workspace)
- ADA compliant walkways/hallways
- Otey Parish Hall (Expanded gathering space and kitchen)

If we exceed our primary goal of \$3,100,000, we will move to complete a challenge goal. These additional funds will be used to refresh and renew our spaces in Barnabas. Creating a space that our young people gravitate toward and want to bring their friends to spend time in is a way for us to fulfill our baptismal commitment to nurture and build them up on their Christian journey.

Reviving our Building, Transforming our Lives

Unchanging God of grace, faithfulness, and truth; Giver of life and all we possess, We pray that as the buildings of St. Paul's are revived, we too, may be transformed spiritually, finding new ways that each of us may be Christ's hands and feet in our ministries and community. Amen.

Dear Friends and Parishioners of St. Paul's,

St. Paul's is about to embark on an exciting opportunity—a capital campaign to raise money to expand our capacity for Christian formation, outreach and service to our parish and the community by renovating and updating our buildings. I am writing to encourage you to join me in giving to bring this new chapter to life..

I think we all agree that St. Paul's is a special church community where lives are changed by our commitment to Christ. My wife Jean and I first visited St. Paul's in 2014. We were living in Chicago at the time and a move to Franklin was not on our radar screen. It was midweek and we decided to enter the nave for some quiet time, prayer and reflection. I was immediately transformed by the beauty of the space. Jean shared that we were in a very special "thin space," (a place where the connection between this world and the divine seems porous, allowing a deep sense of the presence of God). When we later joined the parish we realized that the "thin spaces" extended beyond the nave to include classrooms where wonderful adult, youth and children's formation occurs. They include Founder's Hall, Otey Hall and, yes, even Barnabas. My hope is that through the Capital Campaign, we can refresh our physical campus so we can make room for even greater transformation as we continue to be the hands and feet of Jesus in the future.

It's been four years since the Vestry first entered into a discernment process to explore how we all could improve upon the facilities we offer for important Sunday education and the many meetings that occur during the week. In 2019, we entered into conversation with parishioners about what that vision might entail. There was almost unanimous agreement that we needed to invest in expanded accessibility, modernized classrooms, a refurbished Otey Hall, kitchen and some much needed improvements to Barnabas. We were just about to kick off a capital campaign in 2020 and then COVID hit. As you hopefully know, we decided to resume this campaign this year and have completed a Feasibility Study to help us focus on the projects that resonate most with you.

Please carefully read the Campaign brochure included in your packet in which each project to be funded is fully described. It's important to note that our historic nave and Founders Hall will not be renovated as part of this effort and that special attention is being paid to preserve and protect our beloved outdoor courtyard. You will see in the brochure that the total cost of all the projects included is \$4.5 million. Please prayerfully consider how you will support this campaign and join Jean and me in giving to transform the "thin spaces" we experience here at St. Paul's.

What an exciting time in the life of this parish!







The mission of the Outreach Committee is to embrace community services in Williamson County dedicated to encouraging and advancing development in all people towards their fullest potential, and it is the intent of the committee to assist our church community in sharing God's grace outward into our wider community, participating, donating and encouraging people and the organizations addressing their needs. We intend to promote existing initiatives in our church and continue the conversation within our church community on what we can do for our neighbors in the fulfillment of our Christian duty.

The Outreach Committee would like to thank the parishioners of St. Paul's for entrusting us with such a labor of love. Your financial support is making a difference in the lives of so many people. You are only the reason we can do this, thank you! And, to that effect, we would like to make all aware of exactly who you are helping in our community. So, each month, we would like to share a few of them so you might be able to see and support these organizations.



Gentry's Education Foundation is an organization begun by Evelyn Hickerson, a long time teacher in the Franklin Special School District, to offer children in Franklin the

opportunity to have both educational support and mentoring. They offer afterschool tutoring for low-income children grades K-8th at Johnson Elementary, New Hope Academy and Freedom Intermediate. Kids attending also are introduced to music, sports and cultural experiences. The Outreach Committee awarded Gentry's \$5,000 to assist with their Rescue Fund. The Rescue Fund helps the families of children attending Gentry's that are having housing, utility and food needs.

Cooper Trooper Foundation is a locally based nonprofit started by Missy and Rod Cook when their infant son, Cooper was diagnosed with cancer. They became acutely aware that

the siblings of children undergoing treatment of cancer where lacking in resources. Thus, the Cooper Trooper Foundation was created. The foundation develops and distributes a "Courage Kit" for the brothers and sisters of kids fighting cancer. Each free kit contains special items for the sibling as well as an educational book for parents, which addresses the emotional issues children may be feeling during this difficult time. The Outreach Committee determined that we would allocate \$600 to sponsor the Cooper Troopers Pumpkin Patch, which is a local fundraiser in Cool Springs. Last, but certainly not least, the Outreach Committee decided to grant \$2,600 dollars to Franklin Community Development. This is a local nonprofit that operates the Natchez Social Community Center. St. Paul's has contributed funds this worthwhile organization multiple times. This donation will go for buying shoes for the neighborhood children as the new school year approaches.

Our committee meets the third Tuesday of each month and is always eager to learn from church members about groups in Williamson County that can use this church's extra hand up. Stephen Ministry

The gifts God gave were that some would be apostles, some prophets, some evangelists, some ministers, and teachers, (some Stephen Ministers), to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ. (Ephesians 4:11-13)

There are periods when one feels empty or broken-hearted, or times when there are too many questions and not enough answers. The help of a Stephen Minister may be part of the answers. We are not the solution, but we can be the sounding board for your inner thoughts and search for direction. We can walk with you in search for answers.

A Stephen Minister is a layperson who will provide one-to-one Christian care to confused or hurting people in St. Paul's and the community. Look over the list of needs for care. Are there people with needs described? Yes, there are many people who have these needs. You or someone you know may be one of them.

Please take a moment to reach out to us. Your information is confidential. Our contact with the care receiver is confidential. And the care by the Stephen Minister is confidential. We know that people in need of care suffer alone and may slip through the cracks. The Priests and congregation may not have the means or capacity to reach out to hurting people long term. This is why St. Paul's has a Stephen Ministries program. When necessary, we can be there for the long haul.

- Those who are grieving the loss of a loved one
- People who are hospitalized
- People being treated for cancer -- and members of their families
- Individuals who are terminally ill -- and members of their families
- People who are experiencing divorce (before, during, and after)
- Parents who have children leaving home for the military, college, marriage, or work in another geographical area
- New congregation or community members who are experiencing transition difficulties
- Parents and families with children who have disabilities
- People recovering at home or in a rehabilitation facility after an illness or injury
- Those who are homebound or reside in an assisted living facility or a nursing care center
- Family members of someone (nearby or far away) who is homebound or resides in an assisted living facility or a nursing care center
- People with a chronic illness or a long-term disability-and their primary caregivers
- People facing birth-related issues such as infertility, adoption, an unplanned pregnancy, or the birth of a child
- People who have lost their jobs or had some other significant financial setback
- People experiencing significant job-related stress
- Family members of deployed military personnel
- People in the process of downsizing to a smaller home, moving into an assisted living situation, or changing their living arrangements in some other way
- People who are preparing to retire, who have recently retired, or who have been forced to retire early
- People affected by disasters or violence
- People experiencing spiritual crisis
- People with other critical needs or major life transitions that you know about
