

Planning for Aging and End-of-Life Matters


The Season of Lent is an appropriate time to intentionally consider our mortality.

An Update On Our Future

I was thinking recently about what it means to be a faithful Episcopalian. I concluded that it is not to hold on to what was until our knuckles turn white but it is to live on the spectrum of how we deliver the best of our tradition. That is why I'm so proud and excited about the journey we are on to revitalize our church, it's space for Christian formation, and to enhance our ability to serve our parish community and those that surround us in Franklin.

So, here's an update on where we stand. The city requires that we conduct a parking study before we seek formal approval for our construction. We have hired a firm called Kimley and Horn to do this for us. They will have people outside our church on March 05 to count people and cars. We then will bring their results to the city.

Assuming we get approval, we then will seek quotes from three contractors we have identified to do the construction. With Vestry's input, we will hire one of them.

But before anything begins, we will hold a parish meeting to re-discuss the project and seek your input. I wish I could tell you when that will happen, but getting all of this aligned has taken more time than any of us anticipated.

Please know we have a great group of parishioners who are managing this project and we are committed to keeping you informed.

Stephen Ministry

There are periods when one feels empty or broken-hearted, or times when there are too many questions and not enough answers. The help of a Stephen Minister may be part of the answers. We are not the solution, but we can be the sounding board for your inner thoughts and search for direction. We can walk with you in search for answers.

A Stephen Minister is a layperson who will provide one-to-one Christian care to confused or hurting people in St. Paul's and the community. Look over the list of needs for care. Are there people with needs described? Yes, there are many people who have these needs. You or someone you know may be one of them.

Please take a moment to reach out to us. Your information is confidential. Our contact with the care receiver is confidential. And the care by the Stephen Minister is confidential. We know that people in need of care suffer alone and may slip through the cracks. The Priests and congregation may not have the means or capacity to reach out to hurting people long term. This is why St. Paul's has a Stephen Ministries program. When necessary, we can be there for the long haul.

Needs for Care That Stephen Ministers Can Meet

- Those who are grieving the loss of a loved one
- People who are hospitalized
- People being treated for cancer -- and members of their families
- Individuals who are terminally ill -- and members of their families
- People who are experiencing divorce (before, during, and after)
- Parents who have children leaving home for the military, college, marriage, or work in another geographical area
- New congregation or community members who are experiencing transition difficulties
- Parents and families with children who have disabilities
- People recovering at home or in a rehabilitation facility after an illness or injury
- Those who are homebound or reside in an assisted living facility or a nursing care center
- Family members of someone (nearby or far away) who is homebound or resides in an assisted living facility or a nursing care center
- People with a chronic illness or a long-term disability-and their primary caregivers
- People facing birth-related issues such as infertility, adoption, an unplanned pregnancy, or the birth of a child
- People who have lost their jobs or had some other significant financial setback
- People experiencing significant job-related stress
- Family members of deployed military personnel
- People in the process of downsizing to a smaller home, moving into an assisted living situation, or changing their living arrangements in some other way
- People who are preparing to retire, who have recently retired, or who have been forced to retire early
- People affected by disasters or violence
- People experiencing spiritual crisis
- People with other critical needs or major life transitions that you know about

The Historic Committee

Lest We Forget

This is the second in a series of vignettes on slightly-known incidents in the history of St. Paul's that will appear in The Epistle from time to time.

The Julian Scruggs Funeral

For many years, Julian C. Scruggs Sr. was an active communicant of St. Paul's, serving as a member of the vestry and as senior warden. In the 1940s, he and his family transferred their memberships to a new parish, St. George's in Nashville. In the 1960s, the family selected St. Paul's for his burial service. It was a day not easily forgotten. Principals included Mrs. Ewing Grizzard, the church's longtime organist, The Rev. Sidney Ellis, assisting priest at St. George's and (of course) the late Julian Scruggs. During the prelude to the funeral service, Mrs. Grizzard collapsed at the organ and passed away. Rev. Ellis, without hesitation, opened his 1928 prayer book and administered last rites. (You may not know that the current Episcopal prayer book contains last rites--they are found in Ministration at the Time of Death, immediately preceding Burial of the Dead: Rite 1.) To say the least, total confusion reigned supreme that fateful day in St. Paul's . The service continued without further hitch. And, it is presumed, without music.

Years later, John Henderson of St. Paul's had the opportunity to converse briefly with Rev. Ellis following a church service in Mississippi. He told him that although they had never talked before, they did share a common bond: Franklin, Tennessee and the Julian Scruggs funeral. Rev. Ellis vividly recalled that event.


