



Please know that you are invited and welcomed into the sacred space of the church during the day, especially when you find you need respite from the outside or a break from the busyness of your life.


Some printed resources are available inside the church for you to have.

- A film-based dialogue series on race and faith.

Sacred Ground, The Episcopal Church's eleven week series on race and faith, will be offered in both virtual and in-person formats in early 2024. Built around a powerful curriculum of documentary films and readings, this series invites participants to walk back through history—peel away the layers that brought us to the challenges and divides of the present day and envision a future as Beloved Community. Each session offers space for difficult but respectful dialogue in large and small groups. Parishioners who have completed Sacred Ground have described the series as a transformative springboard for individual and communal growth.



St. Paul's Episcopal's heritage of community outreach dates back nearly 200 years to its first organizational meeting held at what was then a new public building in town—the Hiram Masonic Lodge, founded in 1809.

With a single desire to reach the people of Franklin with the Gospel of Jesus Christ, James Hervey Otey, a teacher and soon-to-be priest, set out in 1827 to form a new space for God's work on the western frontier.

Without a permanent space for worship Rev. Otey reached out to his community through a place where people from different backgrounds gathered on Second Avenue.

Since those earliest days, St. Paul's has been cultivating relationships with our community for two centuries, living out our Baptismal covenant to love and serve one another.

As the St. Paul's parish continues to serve the unmet needs of men, women, and children in the name of Jesus Christ, its Outreach Committee will continue to listen and look for ways to provide food, shelter, health care, and recovery.

If you have questions or suggestions, please contact our members. The Outreach Committee includes clergy, current and former vestry members, as well as representatives from the Men of St. Paul's and Women of St. Paul's organizations.

This is just one unexpected blessing from 2023.

Freedom Reigns Ranch is a faith-based ranch in Middle Tennessee. The mission is to "ignite hope with the help of a horse" by providing mentor sessions to children and young adults who have been through trauma and other life challenges. All programming is offered completely free of charge!

The Outreach Committee began supporting this ministry two years ago. The partnering of an aging horse without purpose and a young person coping with trauma was a mission that caught the attention of Will Boggs and Fred Warner.

The relationship forged between St. Paul's and FRR has been one of care for the health of God's children and care for His creation.



On Saturday, November 11, 2023, Freedom Reigns Ranch had their open house at their new home in south Williamson County.

Since 2016 they have been dreaming of this opportunity to expand their support for children and young adults.

The Men of St. Paul's (MOSP) was asked to provide hamburgers, hot dogs, and all the trimmings for about 225 people.

Fellowship is always central to the work of Men of St. Paul's, just as Rev. Otey began spreading the Gospel in his first gatherings in 1827.

It was an extraordinary honor to have the staff and volunteers of Freedom Reigns Ranch recognize the service of our parish with such gratitude.

The Men of St. Paul's humbly and graciously accepted this surprise honor last month on behalf of the parish family.





The ongoing support from individual pledges and donations by our St. Paul's community gives groups like Freedom Reigns Ranch the opportunity to serve those in need.

As St. Paul's family approaches Advent with expectation and singleness of heart, we give thanks for the many nonprofits in Franklin and Williamson County that call men and women to love and serve their neighbor as Christ has asked us to do.

During 2023 St. Paul's Outreach Committee reached out to approximately seventeen local non-profit, 501c3 organizations.

Listening, but also discerning through faithful prayer and conversation, St. Paul's via the Outreach Committee, made contributions to the respective missions of vital organizations.

Beyond countless hours of fellowship, \$76,000 was gifted to these groups. This amount reflects a portion of the tithes received from you and your family.

From March 2023 through November 2023, the Men of St. Paul's has been able to feed over 3700. Moreover, the Women of St. Paul's has been able to pledge one-third of their financial gifts to the Outreach Committee.

Men, women, and children in need of Christ's love have witnessed first hand the mission of St. Paul's Episcopal Church, and its nearly 200 years of spreading the Gospel in thought, word and deed.

Please accept our sincere thank you. We look forward to continuing our outreach in 2024 with God's help.

Financial Information

Financial Performance for the month of October 2023

October Summary: Ten months into the fiscal year and the parish is within the spending plan proposed, albeit expenses slightly outpace revenues.

Revenues: Monthly collections for revenues were again above expectations, in pledging, in cash-in-plate, and in interest earned. Over \$11,000 above.

Expenses: Expenses were higher than budgeted for the month, and included one-time expenses under Parish Life for the Parish picnic, a Young family's event and the Fall Carnival. Stewardship included costs for the Brunch (10/29). Property Maintenance includes final costs for the Louver installation, but this will be moved to memorials. Outreach was larger than the anticipated budget, but still within the annual budget.

Overall: While the parish spent more than it took in during the month of October, this was expected and the operating budget is still performing over \$46,000 better than anticipated.
