

Jambalaya & Jeopardy



I've just left the Annual Parish meeting, and on behalf of the Stewardship Committee, I want to thank you!



The Senson of Lent At St. Pauls

The season now known as Lent (from an Old English word meaning "spring," the time of lengthening days) has a long history. Originally, Lent was "a season of penitence and fasting," the time of preparation for those who were to be baptized, at the Easter Vigil, the celebration of the Resurrection of the Lord early on Easter Sunday. But since these new members were to be received into a living community of Faith, the entire community was called to preparation. Also, this was the time when those who had been separated from the Church would prepare to rejoin the community.

Today, during the season of Lent all Christians are invited "to the observance of a holy Lent, by self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and self-denial; and by reading and meditating on God's holy Word."

In the western church the forty days of Lent extend from Ash Wednesday through Holy Saturday, omitting Sundays. The last three days of Lent are the sacred Triduum of Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday. The number 40 is connected with many biblical events, but especially with the forty days Jesus spent in the wilderness preparing for His ministry by facing the temptations that could lead him to abandon his mission and calling.

The color used in the sanctuary for most of Lent is purple. This is the color of royalty, and so anticipates through the suffering and death of Jesus, the coming resurrection of Christ as the King of Kings, celebrated on Easter Sunday. There are no beautiful flowers on the altar during Lent, but only greenery or nothing at all. There are no Alleluias said within the liturgies, and there is no celebratory sounding music, but rather music that tends to be more somber.



The Season of Lent At St. Paul's

Ash Wednesday

Wednesday Feb 14 is Ash Wednesday, marking the beginning of the penitential Season of Lent, in the church. Ashes are an ancient sign of penitence. From the Middle Ages it became the custom to begin Lent (the forty days before Easter) by being marked in ash with the sign of the cross. The reminder that we are dust turns our attention to the creative power of God, and God's ability to heal the brokenness in our lives when we offer that brokenness to God. That turning to God is the work of Lent, preparation for the celebration of Jesus's resurrection on Easter Day.



Youth Pilgrimage

Dear St. Paul's Family,

As I am sure most of you know, six of our high school juniors and seniors are going on a pilgrimage this summer! We will be visiting multiple locations within Scotland and England between June 27 and July 6. We pray this trip offers a chance for our youth to grow spiritually, become closer to each other, and solidify their faith before heading off to college. Having a strong foundation of faith and friends will make such a difference when they start that next chapter in their lives.

I also hope that you all are aware of the fundraiser that we launched back in October. It has been ongoing since then; however, we have not met our goal. We had the goal to raise \$20,000 dollars. If the envelope fundraiser is completed, with every envelope being filled with its corresponding number, we would raise exactly \$20,100. So far, we have only received \$2500. Thank you to everyone who has already taken and returned an envelope. We are beyond grateful.

To put everything into perceptive, the cost of pilgrimage per person is \$5,000! This covers airfare, ground transportation, accommodations, and all breakfasts and dinners. We are raising money to pay for two chaperones and to help lessen the financial burden for our youth. Our pilgrims have been working extremely hard to raise money for themselves by participating in car parks, helping with church events, and doing personal fundraising. All that being said, we still cannot do this without your help. This is my official plea to please consider making a donation to the Youth Pilgrimage Fund or participating in the envelope fundraiser. I'm sure you have seen that those boards are still in Founder's Hall. I am writing this on January 2. The balance of our account with Lightline Pilgrimages is due March 15. This means that we have 72 days to raise \$17,500. I know this is a monumental task; however, I also know that we are extremely lucky to be able to call you all our church family. St. Paul's has always been supportive and loving towards the youth group. I experienced that when I was in middle and high school, and I continue to see that as I lead them during this time of transition.


WITS in February and March

Stephen Ministry

The gifts God gave were that some would be apostles, some prophets, some evangelists, some ministers, and teachers, (some Stephen Ministers), to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ. (Ephesians 4:11-13)

There are periods when one feels empty or broken-hearted, or times when there are too many questions and not enough answers. The help of a Stephen Minister may be part of the answers. We are not the solution, but we can be the sounding board for your inner thoughts and search for direction. We can walk with you in search for answers.

A Stephen Minister is a layperson who will provide one-to-one Christian care to confused or hurting people in St. Paul's and the community. Look over the list of needs for care. Are there people with needs described? Yes, there are many people who have these needs. You or someone you know may be one of them.

Please take a moment to reach out to us. Your information is confidential. Our contact with the care receiver is confidential. And the care by the Stephen Minister is confidential. We know that people in need of care suffer alone and may slip through the cracks. The Priests and congregation may not have the means or capacity to reach out to hurting people long term. This is why St. Paul's has a Stephen Ministries program. When necessary, we can be there for the long haul.

Needs for Care That Stephen Ministers Can Meet

- Those who are grieving the loss of a loved one
- People who are hospitalized
- People being treated for cancer -- and members of their families
- Individuals who are terminally ill -- and members of their families
- People who are experiencing divorce (before, during, and after)
- Parents who have children leaving home for the military, college, marriage, or work in another geographical area
- New congregation or community members who are experiencing transition difficulties
- Parents and families with children who have disabilities
- People recovering at home or in a rehabilitation facility after an illness or injury
- Those who are homebound or reside in an assisted living facility or a nursing care center
- Family members of someone (nearby or far away) who is homebound or resides in an assisted living facility or a nursing care center
- People with a chronic illness or a long-term disability-and their primary caregivers
- People facing birth-related issues such as infertility, adoption, an unplanned pregnancy, or the birth of a child
- People who have lost their jobs or had some other significant financial setback
- People experiencing significant job-related stress
- Family members of deployed military personnel
- People in the process of downsizing to a smaller home, moving into an assisted living situation, or changing their living arrangements in some other way
- People who are preparing to retire, who have recently retired, or who have been forced to retire early
- People affected by disasters or violence
- People experiencing spiritual crisis
- People with other critical needs or major life transitions that you know about

Funding from the Bicentennial Society supports our mission of preserving our past, and securing our future by supporting various projects and events that are not provided for in St. Paul's annual budget. As a member, you will play an important role in these endeavors.

<u>Education:</u> St. Paul's recently hosted a History Symposium on the establishment of the early churches in the city of Franklin. This symposium, open to the entire community, was the first of a series of events to both educate and unite our local faith communities. The Bicentennial Society has also helped create the history panels on display in Otey Hall and the self-guided tour brochures of our historic nave.

<u>Preservation:</u> The Bicentennial Society has helped catalogue our historic documents and photographs now maintained at the Williamson County Archives, and will soon undertake the restoration of the broken tombstone of Bishop Otey's son at the front entrance of the church.
