This is a very exciting time for St. Paul's as we will begin to see this blessed project take shape so we can continue to spread better the good news of the gospel in Jesus Christ. Blessings to you all and I hope to see on the 10th.

Vestry Retreat Summary

Earlier this month, our Vestry took part in an annual retreat, returning to Henry Horton State Park. It was an especially convenient and peaceful place to begin our service to the St. Paul's Parish in 2024.

New members were welcomed during some great fellowship Friday night. This truly set the tone for our Saturday work, which was to undertake a Mutual Ministry Review (MMR). We offer our thanks for the talents of the Rev. Molly Dale Smith, who walked us creatively and prayerfully through this multi-step assessment of the Parish's mission and its associated ministries, using the Eucharist as a literal and figurative framework.

If that sounds complicated, it was not.

We began the morning with the Service of the Word Rite II in the Book of Common Prayer and ended the afternoon with a beautiful time of sharing the Eucharist, all the while working intermittently together on a shared plan for the future.

Beginning with the end in mind, we spent time in thanksgiving to God, literally offering our greatest joys from the past three years at St. Paul's.

Our collective thoughts revealed:

The increased participation of parishioners resulted in the growth of many ministries, including an opportunity to increase the Outreach Ministry. In the same way, the blessings of new technology tools used by Clergy and Staff resulted in a more accessible Sunday worship that can be shared easily. We were able to strengthen our finances greatly due to the tremendous stewardship and capital campaigns undertaken.

Next, we used the Baptismal Covenant to acknowledge our shortcomings and sought to identify those aspects of ministry and parish life that might be improved with God's help.

These include moving forward on a part-time Youth Minister; complete the visitor program begun before Covid; and help connect parishioners to opportunities to serve; and continue to give up-to-date information regarding the construction plans.



Vestry Retreat Summary

In 2024, our Vestry will pursue these goals:

We agreed to returning to a program that was launched before Covid, but not completed. It is called Invite Welcome Connect and will be led by Ann Denson, utilizing our Usher Team and other parishioners to ensure that visitors are served.

Second, we committed to ensuring that ministry participation will not be adversely affected by future construction. To that end, meeting space will become an important focus of the Clergy and Staff. We want our program growth to continue to increase.

Third, we committed to establishing a Defined Giving Program for parishioners to utilize in their personal estate planning. This will be led by our Treasurer, Michael Walters-Young.

And, most importantly, the search for a Youth Minister to pick up the wonderful work that Maddie Rogers has been doing on an interim basis is going to continue in earnest. Rusty will lead this effort, but Vestry and parishioners are encouraged to refer prospective candidates.

The MMR led to a mutually-agreed upon set of goals that we believe will strengthen our Parish and also the ministries led by the Clergy, Lay Leaders, and Parishioners. especially as we enter an expansion of our interior classroom/office space.

An excellent turnout of our membership provided a productive meeting Friday night that served as our February Vestry meeting. The fantastic team at Henry Horton provided us with a catered dinner, and evening compline closed out our afternoon.

Episcopal Diocese of Tennessee 192nd Annual Convention

The Convention was held at St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Murfreesboro on February 10, 2024. The convention was moved and shortened from its originally scheduled dates of January 19-20, 2024 due to the inclement weather we had during that period. The attending delegates from St. Paul's, Franklin were Karen Austin, Ed Miller and Jonathan Webster.

Overall, the convention went smoothly. Voting items such as new appointments and nominations went quick and easy. The budget ratification occurred seamlessly. During that budget discussion there with an acknowledgement of the sell of the Dubose Conference Center in Monteagle TN. The center was jointly owned by the three dioceses of TN and funds from the sell were evenly split. While nothing is currently planned for use of those funds, the diocese does plan to use them for educational purposes.

In the Bishop's address, he referenced his own sabbatical in 2023. He had the opportunity to travel the country visiting friends and family while seeing national parks and other landmarks of interest. He noted the overall importance of having a sabbatical for the diocese ministry. It is an opportunity to recharge and refocus, especially in light of the recent overall struggles associated with the pandemic.

Lastly, the convention was a great opportunity to interact with other people in the diocese including ministers, lay people, employees, and volunteers. It was interesting to learn what was occurring in other churches including their struggles and successes. Most of all, it was great to simply socialize with a cup of coffee with other Episcopalians.

The Senson of Lent At St. Pauls

The season now known as Lent (from an Old English word meaning "spring," the time of lengthening days) has a long history. Originally, Lent was "a season of penitence and fasting," the time of preparation for those who were to be baptized, at the Easter Vigil, the celebration of the Resurrection of the Lord early on Easter Sunday. But since these new members were to be received into a living community of Faith, the entire community was called to preparation. Also, this was the time when those who had been separated from the Church would prepare to rejoin the community.

Today, during the season of Lent all Christians are invited "to the observance of a holy Lent, by self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and self-denial; and by reading and meditating on God's holy Word."

In the western church the forty days of Lent extend from Ash Wednesday through Holy Saturday, omitting Sundays. The last three days of Lent are the sacred Triduum of Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday. The number 40 is connected with many biblical events, but especially with the forty days Jesus spent in the wilderness preparing for His ministry by facing the temptations that could lead him to abandon his mission and calling.

The color used in the sanctuary for most of Lent is purple. This is the color of royalty, and so anticipates through the suffering and death of Jesus, the coming resurrection of Christ as the King of Kings, celebrated on Easter Sunday. There are no beautiful flowers on the altar during Lent, but only greenery or nothing at all. There are no Alleluias said within the liturgies, and there is no celebratory sounding music, but rather music that tends to be more somber.






Absalom Jones Celebration Sunday, March 10, 6:00pm Christ Church Cathedral 900 Broadway Nashville, TN 37203

Please join us in celebrating Absalom Jones, the founder of the first Black Episcopal congregation in the United States in 1794. He was the first African American to be ordained as a priest in the Episcopal Church of the United States and is listed on the Episcopal calendar of saints.

The Rt. Rev. John C. Bauerschmidt, Bishop of Tennessee, will be celebrant and Ms. Tabitha Ssonko, Lay Vicar at St. Anselm's Episcopal Church and Campus Ministry for Fisk University, Tennessee State University, and Meharry Medical College, will be our preacher. The Guest Choir is The Chamber Choir from St. Paul's Episcopal Church, Franklin, Donna Stokes-Rogers, Director.

This annual celebration is sponsored by the Beloved Community: Commission for Racial Healing and Reconciliation of the Diocese of Tennessee and hosted by Christ Church Cathedral.

The offering is designated for St. Augustine's University, Raleigh, North Carolina; and Voorheers University, Denmark, South Carolina. They are HBCU's (Historic Black Colleges and Universities) founded by the Episcopal Church.




WITS in March

We know that people in need of care suffer alone and may slip through the cracks. The Priests and congregation may not have the means or capacity to reach out to hurting people long term. This is why St. Paul's has a Stephen Ministries program. When necessary, we can be there for the long haul.

Needs for Care That Stephen Ministers Can Meet

- Those who are grieving the loss of a loved one
- People who are hospitalized
- People being treated for cancer -- and members of their families
- Individuals who are terminally ill -- and members of their families
- People who are experiencing divorce (before, during, and after)
- Parents who have children leaving home for the military, college, marriage, or work in another geographical area
- New congregation or community members who are experiencing transition difficulties
- Parents and families with children who have disabilities
- People recovering at home or in a rehabilitation facility after an illness or injury
- Those who are homebound or reside in an assisted living facility or a nursing care center

January Summary: Preliminary results for the first month of the year are in and the parish performed even better than expected.

Revenues: January is always one of the two best financial months of the year becuase all prepaid pledged are recorded. While overall pledging is still at the targets approved in the budget, the amount of prepaid was MUCH higher than originally forecast, and as a result between regular monthly and prepaid pledges **over 25% of annual pledging** has already been recieved.

Expenses: Expenses were under budget overall. Property Mainentance and Music Ministry were over monthly estimated budgets.
