

Construction Update

Greetings St. Paul's Family!

We are so excited to begin our building transformation soon. At the same time, I'm sure there are a lot of questions about how the church will function for the next 12 months. Please know that the staff and vestry are doing all we can to assure that all our ministries will continue as we serve our parishioners and the community.

First, you should know that the staff will be moving to our temporary offices in Barnabas during the weekend of June 7-9. We hope that construction will begin about that time. We'll have more information soon about how you can help with our move.

Second, we have been working to make sure all our many groups will have sufficient space to continue their good work. We will be making time/space assignments once we get a better idea of the exact time for construction. Most of these meetings, whether weekly or monthly, will take place in Barnabas on Tuesday and Thursday evenings. You may know that our community recovery groups meet in Barnabas on Monday and Wednesday and Friday evenings as well as Saturday morning.

Third, I know that the Sunday bathroom situation is a topic of conversation. While we haven't reached a full agreement we are working with our neighbors, the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, located across the street. We are speaking with them about letting us use their facilities for Sunday morning restrooms and our children's Godly Play during our Formation Hour. Of course, the Barnabas bathroom facilities will be in full use (there are four bathrooms located there).

There is much more to come. Things will certainly get messy but the final outcome will be a blessing. We will all need a little patience (and prayer!) over the coming months ahead. But please know that St. Paul's many ministries will continue, no matter what.

Thank you all for your commitment and your witness to Christ, our Lord. Great days lie ahead!








This year's talent show also featured many works of art members of our congregation created. Otey Hall was lined with paintings, quilts, other textile arts. Thank you to all who participated.


























































First Friday Taize Services

Parish Outreach - Love Thy Neighbor

St. Paul's is beginning a partnership with United4Hope, an organization dedicated to connecting churches and public schools to help students thrive and communities be transformed. Currently, there are 122 churches successfully partnered with 77 schools in Nashville and Franklin.



We will be supporting a few schools in our neighborhood throughout the year, beginning with Franklin Elementary. We're seeking volunteers to help with two events.

For Franklin Elementary's Spring Field Day for 1st through 4th graders on Friday, May 10th we need 7-10 volunteers to help from 8:30 a.m. to noon and 1:00 p.m. to 3:30 p.m.

For an end-of-school-year Teacher Appreciation event on Friday, May 24th we'll be preparing box lunches for 73 teachers the morning of May 24th. We'll purchase all supplies so just need help making sandwiches and assembling the meals.

Volunteers will need to register and attend one hour of online training over the next few weeks and a background check will also be done. Once completed, volunteers can help with any future projects.

The Outreach Committee of St. Paul's Church functions to serve nonprofit organizations. Its vision is to share God's Grace with those in need in Williamson County. The mission of the Outreach Committee is to embrace community services in Williamson County dedicated to encouraging and advancing development in all people towards their fullest potential, and it is the intent of the committee to assist our church community in sharing God's grace outward into our wider community, participating, donating and encouraging people and the organizations addressing their needs. We intend to promote existing initiatives in our church and continue the conversation within our church community on what we can do for our neighbors in the fulfillment of our Christian duty.

The Outreach Committee would like to thank the parishioners of St. Paul's for entrusting us with such a labor of love. Your financial support is making a difference in the lives of so many people. You are only the reason we can do this, thank you! And, to that effect, we would like to make all aware of exactly who you are helping in our community. So, each month, we would like to share a few of them so you might be able to see and support these organizations.



Oak Cottage for Women is a nonprofit in Franklin that provides a residential home for formerly incarcerated women allowing them to re-enter society as productive citizens. Entering this program, the residents have literally the clothes on their backs and few possessions.

Oak Cottage supplies not only shelter and food, but also transportation, counseling, spiritual guidance and life skills. All women must be gainfully employed, participate fully in the program and pay rent each month. Approved by the Tennessee Dept. of Corrections, there have been 41 graduates of the program since it's beginning in 2020 and there is a recidivism rate of 10%. The Franklin Trolley provides almost all the transportation needs of the participants and it costs \$1,300 a month. The Outreach Committee gave \$2,600 to cover the cost of two months of trolley tickets. To learn more about this amazing nonprofit we encourage you to check out their website at oakcottage.org and find a way to participate in changing the lives of women in our community.

Our committee meets the third Tuesday of each month and is always eager to learn from church members about groups in Williamson County that can use our church's extra hand up. Our best nonprofits are found through our parish! Stephen Ministry

The gifts God gave were that some would be apostles, some prophets, some evangelists, some ministers, and teachers, (some Stephen Ministers), to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ. (Ephesians 4:11-13)

There are periods when one feels empty or broken-hearted, or times when there are too many questions and not enough answers. The help of a Stephen Minister may be part of the answers. We are not the solution, but we can be the sounding board for your inner thoughts and search for direction. We can walk with you in search for answers.

A Stephen Minister is a layperson who will provide one-to-one Christian care to confused or hurting people in St. Paul's and the community. Look over the list of needs for care. Are there people with needs described? Yes, there are many people who have these needs. You or someone you know may be one of them.

Please take a moment to reach out to us. Your information is confidential. Our contact with the care receiver is confidential. And the care by the Stephen Minister is confidential. We know that people in need of care suffer alone and may slip through the cracks. The Priests and congregation may not have the means or capacity to reach out to hurting people long term. This is why St. Paul's has a Stephen Ministries program. When necessary, we can be there for the long haul.

Needs for Care That Stephen Ministers Can Meet

- Those who are grieving the loss of a loved one
- · People who are hospitalized
- People being treated for cancer -- and members of their families
- Individuals who are terminally ill -- and members of their families
- People who are experiencing divorce (before, during, and after)
- Parents who have children leaving home for the military, college, marriage, or work in another geographical area
- New congregation or community members who are experiencing transition difficulties
- Parents and families with children who have disabilities
- People recovering at home or in a rehabilitation facility after an illness or injury
- Those who are homebound or reside in an assisted living facility or a nursing care center
- Family members of someone (nearby or far away) who is homebound or resides in an assisted living facility or a nursing care center
- People with a chronic illness or a long-term disability-and their primary caregivers
- People facing birth-related issues such as infertility, adoption, an unplanned pregnancy, or the birth of a child
- People who have lost their jobs or had some other significant financial setback

<u>Education:</u> St. Paul's recently hosted a History Symposium on the establishment of the early churches in the city of Franklin. This symposium, open to the entire community, was the first of a series of events to both educate and unite our local faith communities. The Bicentennial Society has also helped create the history panels on display in Otey Hall and the self-guided tour brochures of our historic nave.

<u>Preservation:</u> The Bicentennial Society has helped catalogue our historic documents and photographs now maintained at the Williamson County Archives, and will soon undertake the restoration of the broken tombstone of Bishop Otey's son at the front entrance of the church.

Presently, the society is helping with the repair of the historic wooded louvers above the front doors of St. Paul's. Keeping the historic parts of our church in good repair is a key goal for the Bicentennial Society.

<u>Celebration:</u> Your membership will also support the many events currently in the planning stages for 2027. When the Bicentennial Society was established in 2017, one of the primary goals was to raise funds to support church-wide and community celebrations without straining the annual operating budget of the church.

Financial Performance for the month of March 2024

March Summary: One quarter through the year and the parish continues to perform better than expected, though March was negative month financially speaking.

Revenues: March collections were 12.5% under expectations, in both pledging and cash in plate were both ahead of expectations. Overall, pledging continues to slightly outpace expectations through 3 months.

Expenses: Expenses were over budget, but only by 1.1%. Essentially, expenses came in where they were anticipated to be, but there are some large swings in these numbers: 1) Music Ministry continues to be over budget for the year by \$5,900.2) Property Maintenance is over budget by nearly \$10,000. Offsetting this is the one-time crediting of insurance proceeds to pay for damage to Barnabas.

Overall: The parish is still performing well through the first three months of 2024, but the expense budget bears watching moving forward.
