

Building Project Apolate

Our building project is moving along at great speed now. The second floor base has been constructed as well as the facade studs and window openings. The concrete block wall is in the process of being built in between rain storms. As soon as the block wall is complete the joists will be installed for the roof and the interior second story stud walls will be built.

The first floor framing is complete and rough ins for electrical and plumbing is taking place this week and next. Our new kitchen appliances for the new Coffee Room and the commercial appliances for Otey Kitchen have been ordered and will be stored in Otey Hall for now. We are doing our part in securing products and building supplies before possible tariffs are in place.




This week we would like to describe our new Library. The new Library will be utilizing the existing stained glass doors that were going into Kristy's old office. They will open in the middle of the long room. These doors will have new wood scribed to the sides in order to meet codes. They will be painted green to match the wood wainscotting in the hallway. The Library will have three walls of floor to ceiling built-in bookshelves, painted a sage green, and have picture style lighting fixtures on top of each shelf. The walls will be creamy white and the window will have a shutter fixture. We think we will want to have a small library table with chairs, a small sofa and comfortable chairs. This will be a true library where we can sit and read and have small group gatherings.





"No women served in Vietnam" became an all too often phrase repeated on a regular basis. Gaining any recognition for their service was next to improbable. The after-effects once they returned to their homes and "regular lives" were deeply troubling and transformative. No one understood the impact of their time there.

The Senson of Lent ATST. Pauls

The season now known as Lent (from an Old English word meaning "spring," the time of lengthening days) has a long history. Originally, Lent was "a season of penitence and fasting," the time of preparation for those who were to be baptized, at the Easter Vigil, the celebration of the Resurrection of the Lord early on Easter Sunday. But since these new members were to be received into a living community of Faith, the entire community was called to preparation. Also, this was the time when those who had been separated from the Church would prepare to rejoin the community.

Today, during the season of Lent all Christians are invited "to the observance of a holy Lent, by self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and self-denial; and by reading and meditating on God's holy Word."

In the western church the forty days of Lent extend from Ash Wednesday through Holy Saturday, omitting Sundays. The last three days of Lent are the sacred Triduum of Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday. The number 40 is connected with many biblical events, but especially with the forty days Jesus spent in the wilderness preparing for His ministry by facing the temptations that could lead him to abandon his mission and calling.



The color used in the sanctuary for most of Lent is purple. This is the color of royalty, and so anticipates through the suffering and death of Jesus, the coming resurrection of Christ as the King of Kings, celebrated on Easter Sunday. There are no beautiful flowers on the altar during Lent, but only greenery or nothing at all. There are no Alleluias said within the liturgies, and there is no celebratory sounding music, but rather music that tends to be more somber.





Anglican Essentials The Sacraments

The Episcopal Church Has Two Sacraments And Five Sacramental Rites

Sacraments

Sacramental Rites

- 1. Eucharist
- 2. Baptism

1. Confirmation

- 2. Ordination
- 3. Holy Matrimony
- 4. Reconciliation of the Penitent
- 5. Unction

A Sacrament is an outward and visible sign of an inward and spiritual grace.

Three elements make up a sacrament:

- 1) Matter
- 2) Symbolic Reality or Mystery
- 3) Effect

Thomas Aquinas originally set up the seven as sacraments. To him, they all were instituted by Christ. The 39 Articles changed the number down to two, as necessary for all Christians.

Formation

SACRAMENTS

Baptism

The full initiation by water and the Holy Spirit into Christ's Body, the Church.

Eucharist

Meaning "Thanksgiving" It is the supreme act of Christian worship and the central act of our liturgy.

SACRAMENTAL RITES

Confirmation

A Mature expression of our commitment to Christ. It calls and equips us for ministry.

Ordination

The authority and grace given by God to certain leaders of the church. We are all a priesthood of believers.

Matrimony

Makes vows before God and the Church and receives a blessing from the priest or bishop. Its' for mutual joy, help and comfort, and for kids (God willing).

Reconciliation of the Penitent

Confessing sins in the presence of a priest. It's the continuing forgiveness of God's will for us and the gift of renewal.

Unction

The healing of body mind and spirit by oil or laying on of hands.





Education for Ministry (EFM)

St. Paul's Education for Ministry (EfM) group will hold an open house in Barnabas Tuesday April 29th, 6:00 pm. You're invited!

EfM is an adult formation program for the laity, administered by the University of the South. It examines the bible, church history, and Christian theology. Next fall, EfM will launch a new curriculum including a single-year, "Wide Angle" offering. New materials include written texts, podcasts and short videos.

As the EfM website states, "the EfM program is designed to help (lay) Christians prepare for their ministry. It is that vocation for which we pray at the end of the communion service: 'And now, send us out to do the work you have given us to do, to love and serve you as faithful witnesses of Christ our Lord."

Grief Support Group at St. Paul's

Bicentennial Society

Honoring St. Paul's 200th Anniversary

Our St. Paul's Episcopal Church was founded on August 25th, 1827, in a room of the Hiram Masonic Lodge #7 in Franklin when those persons "friendly to the formation of an Episcopal church in the area" met under the leadership of Reverend James Hervey Otey. Honored as the "Mother Church of the Diocese of Tennessee," St. Paul's led the way for Episcopal congregations to bloom throughout our state.

Today, there are three organizations committed to preserving the legacy of St. Paul's.

- The Historic Committee focuses on preserving our past and securing our future by supporting various projects and events that are not provided for in St. Paul's annual budget.
- **The Bicentennial Committee**, which is overseen by The Historic Committee, is responsible for planning and executing activities connected with the Bicentennial in 2027.
- **The Bicentennial Society** is a fundraising entity dedicated to providing financial support for the work of both the Historic and Bicentennial Committees.

Examples of projects that have been funded by the Bicentennial Society include:

Education: We are hosting several historic symposiums on Franklin's early churches and their role in sowing the seeds that helped make Franklin a vibrant, growing community. These events are open to the public and focused on both educating and uniting our local faith communities. We were also instrumental in creating the beautiful history panels on display in Otey Hall and the self-guided tour brochures for our historic Church.

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Preservation: The Bicentennial Society has supported cataloguing of our historic documents and photographs and restored the broken tombstone of Bishop Otey's son just outside the front entrance of the Church. We also contributed to the repair of the historic wooden louvers above the front doors of St. Paul's, improving both form and function.

Celebration: Each year we host a festive birthday party for the parish, counting down the years to our Bicentennial in 2027.

Finances


Financial Performance for the month of February 2025

January Summary: Two months into the fiscal year and the parish remains where it wants to be - in an incredibly strong financial position.

Revenues: Cash-In-Plate and pledging remain very strong. Cash-in-Plate through two months is double the anticipated budget, and pledging for the month of February was nearly \$25,000 more than the anticipated budget. Taking into account the regular monthly pledges received, the parish has raised 36% of all of its expected income for the year - in one month.

Expenses: Expenses were more than \$11,000 under budget for the month, and are nearly \$8,000 under budget for the year-to-date. While Personnel costs are nearly right on budget, the parish has lower insurance and outreach expenses than anticipated (Insurance received a reimbursement for the now canceled premium for the former van owned by the parish). Music costs were higher than anticipated.

Overall: The parish starts the year nearly \$254,000 to the good.
