On one occasion when Jesus was going to the house of a leader of the Pharisees to eat a meal on the sabbath, they were watching him closely. When he noticed how the guests chose the places of honor, he told them a parable. "When you are invited by someone to a wedding banquet, do not sit down at the place of honor, in case someone more distinguished than you has been invited by your host; and the host who invited both of you may come and say to you, 'Give this person your place,' and then in disgrace you would start to take the lowest place. But when you are invited, go and sit down at the lowest place, so that when your host comes, he may say to you, 'Friend, move up higher'; then you will be honored in the presence of all who sit at the table with you. For all who exalt themselves will be humbled, and those who humble themselves will be exalted." He said also to the one who had invited him, "When you give a luncheon or a dinner, do not invite your friends or your brothers or your relatives or rich neighbors, in case they may invite you in return, and you would be repaid. But when you give a banquet, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, and the blind. And you will be blessed, because they cannot repay you, for you will be repaid at the resurrection of the righteous."

Building Update

Our building project is coming along very well! The brick facade on 6th Ave. is complete, and a new metal roof will be installed next week on the exterior ramp hallway. The scale of the new addition and the new brick will make for a beautiful courtyard. This week, the new sprinkler system is being installed in Founders Hall, and the ceiling will be patched up after the city inspection is complete. Ceiling inspections for the 1st and 2nd floor have passed, and framing for the 2nd floor ceilings is being completed and will receive new drywall this week as well. The air conditioning is set to start operating on September 4, then finish materials will start being installed. Much of the interior finish materials like wood, millwork, vinyl flooring, and such need to be acclimated to interior a/c conditions before installing. The new library will have the double doors with stained glass that once was in the reception room leading into Kristy's old office. These existing doors will be built up so as to meet current door codes. Our contractors will have a skilled woodworker scribe wood slats to the top, sides, and bottom to meet codes. The wood will be painted a sage green to match the rest of the new millwork. This is a good example of our architects and contractors willing to salvage old, meaningful pieces of our past and



thoughtfully incorporate them into our new, fresh space. It will be a delightful opening into our new library. Another example is the existing brick flooring in the reception area will remain, and new vinyl plank wood floor will about with the brick. Originally, we were intending to install porcelain tile here, but later decided to keep the brick floor as an homage to our past. This quirky floor design will be an amusing detail, and be a less expensive option! Next week we'll be ordering new furniture for all the offices, chairs for meeting rooms and chairs and tables for Otey Hall. We are still on target to finish our project November 26 and I'm sure a great celebration will be had by all of us. Thank you for all your support and encouragement.
