Room In The Inn

St. Paul's has been invited to participate with Franklin First United Methodist Church (FFUMC) in hosting homeless guests as part of their Room In The Inn (RITI) program this winter.

RITI began in the winter of 1985, when the Founding Director, Father Charles Strobel, opened the doors of his parish to individuals seeking sanctuary in the church parking lot. This simple act of kindness marked the beginning of Room In The Inn. In December 1986, four congregations committed to sheltering people experiencing homeless through March 1987. By the end of that winter, 31 congregations had joined. Now, they have nearly 200 congregations from a wide variety of traditions and over 7,000 volunteers who shelter almost 1,500 men and women from November 1 through March 31 each season. FFUMC has been hosting RITI guests for many years now and members of St. Paul's have assisted FFUMC as Innkeepers for several years, as well. We now have an opportunity to increase our participation by "sponsoring" a St. Paul's RITI night by assisting set-up, providing meals and lunches, and innkeeping (stay overnight with guests) for 2-3 nights this winter.

The RITI season starts November 1 and runs through March 31. FFUMC takes guests every Thursday night during this period. We are looking for St. Paul's to support up to 2-3 nights this winter and then see where the Lord takes us in the future.

For each "St. Paul's" night, we will need 1-2 set-up volunteers, 2 male innkeepers and 8-10 volunteers to make dinner (and next day lunches) for our guests. Volunteers will be required to complete FFUMC background checks and safe sanctuary training. FFUMC has scheduled Safe Sanctuary training on October 22 at FFUMC at 6:15 pm.




This month we met with Friends of WCAC which is a nonprofit created to assist and support the Williamson County Animal Center. This wonderful organization provides financial and volunteer support that helps ensure and enhance the lives of the 3,900 animals that come through their doors each year. They cover the cost of a veterinarian, an assistant, and a CPA while also providing free food and spay and neuter services for low income families. The Outreach Committee has decided to grant Friends of WCAC 3,000 dollars which will cover the cost of one month of their Paw Pantry food distribution program. Honoring St. Paul's 200th Anniversary

Our St. Paul's Episcopal Church was founded on August 25th, 1827, in a room of the Hiram Masonic Lodge #7 in Franklin when those persons "friendly to the formation of an Episcopal church in the area" met under the leadership of Reverend James Hervey Otey. Honored as the "Mother Church of the Diocese of Tennessee," St. Paul's led the way for Episcopal congregations to bloom throughout our state.

Today, there are three organizations committed to preserving the legacy of St. Paul's.

- The Historic Committee focuses on preserving our past and securing our future by supporting various projects and events that are not provided for in St. Paul's annual budget.
- **The Bicentennial Committee**, which is overseen by The Historic Committee, is responsible for planning and executing activities connected with the Bicentennial in 2027.
- **The Bicentennial Society** is a fundraising entity dedicated to providing financial support for the work of both the Historic and Bicentennial Committees.

Examples of projects that have been funded by the Bicentennial Society include:

Education: We are hosting several historic symposiums on Franklin's early churches and their role in sowing the seeds that helped make Franklin a vibrant, growing community. These events are open to the public and focused on both educating and uniting our local faith communities. We were also instrumental in creating the beautiful history panels on display in Otey Hall and the self-guided tour brochures for our historic Church.

Financial Performance for the Month of August 2025

August Summary: August was supposed to be another summer month - more outflows than inflows. But whereas a large deficit was planned, strong pledging and lower expenses had the parish nearly breaking even for the month.

Revenues: Pledges were much higher than budgeted - by over \$28,000. Cash-In-Plate came in where expected. For the year-to-date, the parish is 6.2% over expectations in collections.

Expenses: Expenses were under the monthly budget by 10.9%. In personnel, lower than expected medical premiums result in the decrease. In operations, expenses were lower than expectations in two areas - utilities and outreach. The utility budget is nearly spent for water, electric and gas through the first 8 months of the year.

Overall: The parish budgeted for \$39,333 but operationally ran a surplus of \$103. For the year, the parish remains \$64,443 to the good.
