#### **History of a Sacred Space**

# Presentation Given by Mike Wesson

Wherever God's people congregate, there is a sacred space. But, some spaces are more sacred than others. And so it is with our sacred space at St. Paul's.

In January 1831, while St. Paul's was in its original home at the Masonic Hall, the Vestry (like all Vestries) named a "Building Committee" to "select a site...whereon to erect a church Edifice." That June, the Right Reverend William Meade, who was the assistant Bishop of Virginia at the time and was known to make many parish visits west of Virginia, laid the cornerstone on the Church's lot in Hincheyville, Franklin's first subdivision.

St. Paul's was built in the tradition of English Gothic churches: simple and pointedly not Anglo-Catholic (think Grantchester, Downtown Abbey, and Midsomer Murders). Back then, folks were focused on Heaven and building churches tall with high towers and arches presumably would draw eyes to Heaven. Bishop Otey likely demanded that to his taste the building be simple.




Print at Williamson County Archives showing St. Paul's as central to Franklin's historic buildings.

By 1833, the church was still in progress. The undercroft – originally supposed to be the resting place for Rev. Otey and his wife – was dug out and the high clay content dirt was used to make hand-made wood-mold bricks on the property. The walls were designed as layers 18" to 24" thick, supported by three buttresses on each side.

Parishes in New York and Philadelphia made gifts totaling \$550 (\$21,000 in today's dollars); that money, plus local funds, plus a final \$500 authorized by the Vestry completed St. Paul's building in November 1834. The building measured 40' by 80' with a 50' bell tower on the south, had the first pipe organ west of the Appalachians, and was consecrated on November 21, 1835.

St. Paul's was what was known as a "three-decker" or "three-tier" church: undercroft, nave, and galleries (which were likely for people enslaved by parishioners). There was probably a "three-tier" pulpit as well – one that elevated the preacher so that he could be heard in the galleries as well as the floor.



Many, if not most, Episcopal churches of the time were oriented west to east, with the Altar (and celebrant) facing east – toward Jerusalem. Because of the direction of the street in front, St. Paul's is oriented slightly NW to SE, so the original altar faced to the southeast. No drawings of St. Paul's at the time of consecration can be found. A 1960 Nashville Banner article about St. Paul's mentions that the building had a flat roof, but it is probably more likely that the roof was sloped - much like St. John's Ashwood. Flat or low-pitched roofs were not fashionable in that part of the 19th century.


Artist's conception of flat-roofed St. Paul's

Because of the impending war, St. Paul's essentially ceased to be a house of worship in 1859 – few congregants, no vestry, and no rector. On February 23, 1863 the Federal army came. Nashville was evacuated and Franklin was occupied. The Union force wasted no time occupying St. Paul's. They chopped up the pews, the altar, and that \$800 pipe organ for firewood. Fires were built in what is now the Narthex with the bell tower as the chimney.

The Battle of Franklin was fought on November 30, 1864 and St. Paul's – literally within sight of the line of the battle - was used as a hospital. A story goes that soldiers hacked notches in the pillars to make room for more beds. The poplar floors ran red with blood.

When the War ended, what remained was a decimated parish with a desecrated building. For a while the building was used as a stable and a carpenter's shop. There is another story that the notches in the columns were where feeding troughs were nailed up. You decide.

Eventually, the seventeen women and four men who made up the congregation called Rev. Edward Bradley of Memphis as Rector. A vestry was elected and Rev. Bradley solicited funds nationwide to begin the reconstruction of St. Paul's. And this reconstruction is, as a practical matter, what we see today. The roof was removed and the high brick walls were lowered 20 feet. Those bricks were used to build a parish hall and rectory on the north end of the Church - today's Founders Hall. The altar was moved to of the nave and the north end surrounded wood-paneled by а "apozoidal" chancel. A new organ was installed, and the galleries were removed. Since the galleries were gone, there was no need for the three-tier pulpit, so it was removed well. St. Paul's as was reconsecrated as a house of worship in 1871. At that time, additional lots were purchased on the north side to Fair Street.

In 1887, the Presbyterians tore down their church building to build a new one; St. Paul's purchased the iron fence from them that still runs in front of the church.

The next major addition to St. Paul's came in 1970, when a frame building at the side was torn down and the education wing was built (at a cost of \$60,000). A concurrent renovation found the door on the right side of the altar that matches the one on the left. Poplar flooring with handmade, square nails was found in the narthex. That renovation also saw the nave carpeted in red, Belgian wool carpeting.

Beginning in 1959, Southern Bell leased the very back part of the property and a building built by the church and had their business office there fronting Fair Street. That building was torn down in 1979 to make room for what is now Otey Hall.

As a side note, if you've ever walked west on Main Street toward St. Paul's and thought, "that tower is leaning," it's not just you. The engineering firm of Marr and Holman in Nashville was engaged in the 1970s to study the tower and concluded that it is actually 11 inches out of plumb. Just to be reassuring, though, the tower was reinforced about 10 years ago.


So, St. Paul's grows and prospers, growing both old and new, and a new addition built like the original church – toward Heaven - is close to completion. But the historic, sacred heart of our church goes back to James Otey and those vestry members who, in 1831, had the vision and the wisdom and the courage to build our sacred space.









### **Bicentennial Society**

Our St. Paul's Episcopal Church was founded on August 25th, 1827, in a room of the Hiram Masonic Lodge #7 in Franklin when those persons "friendly to the formation of an Episcopal church in the area" met under the leadership of Reverend James Hervey Otey. Honored as the "Mother Church of the Diocese of Tennessee," St. Paul's led the way for Episcopal congregations to bloom throughout our state.

Today, there are three organizations committed to preserving the legacy of St. Paul's.

- The Historic Committee focuses on preserving our past and securing our future by supporting various projects and events that are not provided for in St. Paul's annual budget.
- **The Bicentennial Committee**, which is overseen by The Historic Committee, is responsible for planning and executing activities connected with the Bicentennial in 2027.
- **The Bicentennial Society** is a fundraising entity dedicated to providing financial support for the work of both the Historic and Bicentennial Committees.

Examples of projects that have been funded by the Bicentennial Society include:

**Education:** We are hosting several historic symposiums on Franklin's early churches and their role in sowing the seeds that helped make Franklin a vibrant, growing community. These events are open to the public and focused on both educating and uniting our local faith communities. We were also instrumental in creating the beautiful history panels on display in Otey Hall and the self-guided tour brochures for our historic Church.

#### Financial Performance for the Month of September 2025

**September Summary:** Three-fourths through the year and the parish is performing better than expected

**Revenues:** Pledges and cash-in-plate were much higher than expected - by over 30%. The return of regular services and the program year bolstered collections. For the year, we have collected nearly 87% of expected total cash-in-plate - with 3 months to go.

**Expenses:** Expenses were over budget in Personnel and under in Operations. Personnel costs were higher in Salaries, Health Insurance and Social Security Allowance - the later two being an issue of timing. In operations, expenses were higher in Music and Utilities and lower in numerous areas.

**Overall:** The parish budgeted for \$32,436 loss but operationally ran a deficit of only \$10,243. For the year, the parish remains \$78,000 to the good.
