

Report From The Rector



I think it goes without saying, but 2025 was one of the busiest and most fruitful years in the recent memory of St. Paul's. But even in the midst of the various changes in our parish, we continued to keep to our goal of worshipping Jesus and providing for our community.

Obviously, the biggest event this past year was moving into our newly renovated and enlarged building. Already we are seeing how the expansion is helping our many ministries. I hope that you agree with me that the building turned out to be beautiful, both inside and out.

Report from the Senior Warden



What a year and what a finish! I am grateful for all that has been accomplished in these past 12+ months! As I was considering taking on the role of Senior Warden, I was concerned about funding the capital project (with the least possible debt), maintaining ministries and our parish in the midst of this great upheaval and continuing to grow services with the support of the congregation. I can only imagine the conversation in heaven one year ago (January 2025). I imagine Jesus approaching St. Paul and discussing my pending role as Senior Warden and the year ahead:

Jesus saying, "Well, we are getting a lot of prayers from Paul Hannah and the parishioners at St. Paul's Church in Franklin, TN. They seem to be worried about the large project they have taken on to expand the church. They seem especially concerned about meeting the construction deadline and raising more funds to meet the increased cost.

St. Peter adds - You know St. Paul's has had great leadership in the past – you know what a great job Reverends Rusty and Monna, Vestry Sr. Wardens George and Pam did leading St. Paul's Church over the past two years – 2023 and 2024. I am sure we can help the new Senior Warden, Paul in 2025!

Fortunately, St. Paul replies, "Hold on Peter! You say there is a Paul at St. Paul's that needs our help? Us Pauls have to stick together! I am willing to offer my help. Let me check on the status of things at one of my favorite churches!"

(Since this is in heaven, St. Paul was back with the information in a flash - Of course!)

"Well, I have been checking on St. Paul's Church, and the current status in January 2025 seems very good – over the past three (3) years the church has remained stable and growing, despite the challenges of Covid and the new construction. In fact, the current status is as follows:

- a. The church enjoys strong faithful leadership with Reverends Rusty, Monna and Ann AND strong support from their staff with Donna, Holli, Libby, Brett, Kristy, Shannon and Paula.
- b. Likewise, the Church enjoys experienced leadership from the Vestry and numerous committees and ministries. Paul can rely on the counsel of his experienced and diverse vestry members - Mindy Boggs, Ann Denson, Spencer Dibble, Angela Lassiter, Junior Warden Jim Miller, Melissa Monterro, Chris Oberholtzer, Holly Spain, Bruce Theobald, Jonathan Webster and Larry Whitlock.
- c. The leadership has completed designs for almost doubling the meeting and workspaces of the church and has hired experienced architectural and construction support from a seasoned construction firm, with supervision by Susan Miller of the parish.
- d. The parish has raised significant funds in their initial capital campaign to get the project started.

e. The church enjoys a strong financial position and has secured bank financing for the project through the help of Michael Walters Young of the parish and a congregation that consistently meets the annual stewardship funding needs to maintain their important ministries.

f. The Diocese and the City of Franklin have granted their approval and support. In fact, the project is well underway and is scheduled to be completed by the end of 2025 (earth time).

Jesus continues "I am so proud of this parish and the leadership that has continued the important service of the church during this time! As I understand it, despite the challenges of having their working space disrupted, the clergy and staff also squeezed into the building next door and continued the incredible ministries of St. Paul's Church during this time!"

Paul added, "Yes, Lord, numerous parishioners stepped in to continue their important ministries and to help with moving and storing furniture."

a. They did not just focus on their campus ministries, but through Lay Ministers, Jean, Charlie, Karen, Peggy, Gerald, Ellen, Greer, Jackie, Cyndy, Barb, Melanie, Fred, Marcia, Carol, Debbie, Ginna, Judy, Kathy, Ann, Pat, Laura, Larry and many others continued their important outreach into the community during this period

b. Also, the second capital campaign has just begun and Peter can confirm it will be a great success all while minimizing the church borrowing. Too bad Sr. Warden Paul and the rest of the Vestry do not know this or they would be more relaxed.

Jesus agrees "I have been impressed with the commitment of so many of my faithful who demonstrate with their time, talent and treasures to Loving their Neighbors and worshiping my Father. St. Paul's Church has nothing to worry about!"

St. Paul continues, "I am so proud to have my name on this church!"

Jesus: I like this plan, with all that has been completed, with the current leadership and resources available, and the ongoing commitment of the parish, I am confident that St. Paul's will thrive in the next year. Report from the Junior Warden




Wow, what a year! The year began with the church project well underway and most activities being held in Barnabas. It also began with the rooftop HVAC units needing to be replaced. Both were replaced in the first quarter. The rest of the year was consumed with helping on the project. Two items of note were the bidding out and awarding contracts for the HVAC service provider and cleaning. Two new vendors were selected and have begun their work. A few other things I was involved in on the project were attending OAC (Owner, Architect, Contractor) meetings, purchasing items for the new space and receiving a bid for the stained-glass window outside of the nursery. Once we moved the staff in early December, there still remains several things to button up such as working on the TV's on the second floor to ensure we can cast to them from a laptop for presentations.

Earlier in the year, I was asked to procure a bid for another columbarium in the Main Street courtyard. After receiving the bid, Rusty formed a small committee to discuss the path forward on a columbarium. The committee recommended that we move forward with a memorial garden rather than a physical columbarium. The reasoning is that a physical columbarium is expensive and finite in how many can be interred in them. Also, we have limited space in the Main Street courtyard. A memorial garden is designed to only inter ashes in biodegradable boxes allowing an infinite number of ashes to be buried. A wall will be erected with a small plaque added for each interment.

I am honored to serve as Junior Warden again and look forward to a more relaxed 2026!

Christian Formation

Adults

These Christian Formation classes were offered for Adults in 2025 on Sunday morning:

1) Due to construction, Adult Christian Formation Classes were held on Sundays in Founders Hall throughout the program year.

- In January and part of February we focused on the “Wise Men (aka the Three Kings, or the Magi),” and we explored scriptures, prayers, and a bit of theology associated with the liturgical season of Epiphany.
- For the last half of February, Rev. Rusty McCown offered a 2-week series on “Angels and The Bible,” looking at angels depicted in both the Old and New Testaments to learn better their role in God’s salvation story.
- In March, Dr. Jon Roebuck led a 3-week series on “Striving for Accuracy – Guidelines for Interpreting Scripture.” This class examined some principles of Biblical text interpretation that we can apply whenever we choose to study the Bible.
- Next, Rev. Bob Abtein led a 3-week series on the early chapters of Genesis, looking at Creation and other ancient stories. This class explored what these stories have to tell us today.
- Jean Larson led a series on “The Acts of the Apostles,” and took a deeper dive into what the 5th book of the New Testament teaches us about our own faith journeys.
- We started off the Fall with a series on “The Nature of Jesus,” led by Rev. Rusty McCown. This series focused on Jesus using the things that surround us—nature, to teach his disciples. It examined what we can learn from the simple but profound items that are all around us.
- During October, Dewees Berry facilitated 3 classes, each on a different topic. The first was on “Bible Stories in Song and Verse” (works by Lord Byron, Ira Gershwin, and others). The next one was on “Don’t Pigeonhole Me!” (a whimsical look at stereotypes, including some about Episcopalians). Lastly, he offered a class on “Selected Passages from The Gospel of Mark” (using vignettes from the hit Broadway play).
- A 3-week series on “Miracle and Message: What miracles of the New Testament Have to Say to Us Today,” followed in late October and early November. This class, led by Dr. Jon Roebuck, looked at three different miracles from the Gospels in the Book of Acts to draw meaning for everyday application.
- Jean Larson facilitated a 2-week series on “Disciples in the 21st Century,” which in focusing on Jesus’ call to his disciples to leave their nets and follow him, posed the question for us, “What is Jesus calling us to do today?”
- In December, we turned to the season of Advent. First, we gave our attention to 4 core themes that come to light this season - “Hope, Peace, Joy, and Love.” Rev. Monna Mayhall led a class exploring each theme, considering what each means for us in our own lives. Rev. Rusty McCown ended the Christian Formation year with a class about the “Characters of Advent,” which looked at the various people who make up the holy season of Advent.

2) Rev. Rusty McCown taught a Seekers Class in the Spring of 2025, which met in Barnabas. This class was offered for those who wished to join the church through Confirmation or Reception. It was also offered as a refresher course for anyone. Bishop Bauerschmidt came in the Spring for his annual visit and Confirmation.

In addition to Sunday Adult programs, there were also Christian Formation regular weekly programs which included:

The Tuesday Morning Lectionary Bible Study

The Coffee Club

Coffee Club is a men's Bible study, meeting each Wednesday at 6:45 in the Barnabas conference room. Our time together lasts about one hour. We generally check in with each other, read the gospel lesson for the upcoming Sunday and discuss what the passage meant to those hearing it a long time ago and what it means for us today. Coffee Club is a low-key Bible study that simply is attempting to read and understand better God's holy Word and how we can take it out to the world. Please join us. Education for Ministry (EfM)

St. Paul's has two active Education for Ministry (EfM) seminar groups, comprised of a total of 17 participants and two mentors this year. EfM is an international adult Christian Formation program administered by The University of the South. One participant completed the four-year program last summer and five new members joined in the fall of 2024. Seven alumni returned to start a new 5th year curriculum.



Both groups meet weekly on Tuesday evenings to study Hebrew Scripture, the New Testament, church history and theology, in a small group setting. We try to attend in person, but participants are welcome to Zoom in. We also share spiritual autobiographies and work on theological reflections, a way of finding God in our everyday lives.

Youth - EYG

The St. Paul's Youth Ministry offers a space for students in 6th to 12th grade to cultivate meaningful friendships through fellowship and deepen their faith through prayer, study, and service. Below are highlights of activities that St. Paul's youth participated in this past year!

EYG (Episcopal Youth Group): EYG meets most Sunday evenings in Barnabas. In August we welcomed Ashley Anderson to our youth leadership as the Youth Intern! She has helped with planning activities, chaperoning, making social media posts, and has been a great addition to EYG! In 2025, we met from 5-7 in the spring and transitioned to 4:30 – 6 in the fall. Our time together includes a combination of games and activities, small group time, and Compline. A few times during the year we participated in service activities in lieu of our evening meeting. Four times in 2025 we joined the Church in the Yard (CITY) ministry on Sunday afternoon in Nashville to help serve lunch. We also joined with Diocesan Youth in November to pack hygiene kits for Saint Luke's Community House. Attendance ranged widely in 2025, with peak events having 15 youth, and some evenings having 2-3 students.



Youth Christian Formation: Youth Christian Formation meets on Sunday mornings from 10:00am-11:00am. In the spring of 2025, we used video lessons to ask a common question about God and faith and explore that question together. In the fall, Robert Collins joined us as a formation teacher! The class focused on different ways to read and study the Bible, using Philippians as an example.

Youth Confirmation: In 2025, Confirmation Class was led by Jay Fahey and 6 youth were confirmed! The youth had a great experience with Jay and he will lead the class again this year.

SPECIAL YOUTH EVENTS IN 2025

Pancake Supper: In March, the youth held our annual Pancake Supper to raise money for Mountain T.O.P. It looked a little different hosting in Barnabas with two different seating times, but the night was a success, raising \$2100 from selling both tickets and items from our take home menu. Thank you to all the volunteers and the Men of St. Paul's for covering ingredient costs and cooking pancakes outside!

Youth Sunday: On Mother's Day, the youth led two of our Sunday morning services, serving as readers, ushers, and acolytes. Three of our 2025 graduating seniors, Adam Curwen, Emma Haddon, and William Swallows, gave sermons. They were each uniquely poignant, making for a very special service.




Mountain T.O.P: 2025 was St. Paul's 27th year attending summer camp at Mountain Tennessee Outreach Project (Mountain T.O.P.). For a week in July, 8 St. Paul's youth and 6 adults served families in Grundy County, one of the most impoverished counties in Tennessee, through home repair projects and day camps for children ages 6-11. We were also thrilled to host 4 youth and 2 adults from Marysville United Methodist Church in Marysville, Michigan as a part of our church group at MTOP.



Week of Wonder (WOW): We had another wonderful WOW this summer where we got to pretend each day was a different season. Many youth (rising 5th – college students) volunteered to lead small groups and activities, including games, crafts, snacks, and science stations. One afternoon we celebrated our youth volunteers with ice cream sandwiches!

Car Parks: The youth raised \$3,200 in 2025 by charging cars to park in our parking lot behind Barnabas during downtown Franklin festivals. This money is used to cover youth and adult MTOP tuition, travel expenses, and Pilgrimage fees.

Winter Lock-In: 14 youth and 3 adult chaperones had the best time at our winter lock-in! We had a full and fun night, starting with rock climbing at The Crag in Cool Springs. We then returned to the church to go caroling down Main Street. Then we got to know our new building in a way only youth can – by playing Grog for hours! We wrapped up our night by watching the Grinch in our PJs and lighting the last Advent candle at midnight. Volunteers chaperoned and drove our students to rock climbing, the Men of St. Paul's provided our meals, and the Women of St. Paul's created special gift bags for the youth! It was a team effort for a wonderful event – thank you to everyone who participated!

Children With Families

Sunday Christian Formation

We continued to use Godly Play for our Sunday Formation for Children in 2025, with all of the children combined to one circle in our temporary space inside Barnabas. Despite the limitations of our space, the program thrived thanks to the extra efforts of GP volunteers, our biscuit ministry team who provided special service to Barnabas, and of course our children for being flexible and showing up with their smiling faces each week. We continued to work in the Free Little Pantry each week, and the children took ownership by bringing in food donations for this ministry. On our last Sunday before summer break, we had "Share the Light" Sunday where children brought items to help stock the Free Little Pantry over the summer, and shared ice cream sundaes as we sent our 5th graders off to Youth Group. On All Saint's Sunday, we honored loved ones we've lost by sharing their stories, photos and favorite foods together in a time of remembrance.

Children's Chapel

Children's Chapel was available for 8:45 and 11 am services, except for the summer when we only had one service at 10 am. There was an average of 12-20 children who attended each Sunday. During Children's Chapel, we share the Gospel story in child-inclusive language and share a picture book with a similar theme. Afterwards we share a lively discussion and say our version of prayers of the people before we exchange the peace and head back to the service to join our families. During August and September, Donna came to Children' Chapel to teach us a song that the children sang at the Children's Service on September 28th. During November we learned a song that the children shared at Advent Lessons and Carols on December 7th.



Week of Wonder — Seeds and Seasons

Week of Wonder was held off-site at Jim Warren Park screened pavilion for the third year. Thirty-seven participants and 31 youth and adult volunteers made it a memorable week as we explored how each season brings both gifts and challenges. We had a great turn-out for the wrap up pizza party on Thursday night. The participants wore their t-shirts to church on Sunday to share a song with the congregation. Daughters of the King – DOK

The Order of the Daughters of the King is an international order for women who are communicants of the Episcopal Church, churches in communion with it, or churches in the historic episcopate but not in communion with it. Members of The Order undertake a Rule of Life, incorporating the Rule of Prayer and the Rule of Service. By reaffirmation of the promises made at Baptism and Confirmation, a Daughter pledges herself to a life-long program of Prayer, Service, and Evangelism, dedicated to the spread of Christ's Kingdom and the strengthening of the spiritual life of her parish.



Each member's personal Rule of Life reflects her unique spiritual journey. A Daughter's Rule of Life is not taken lightly but is developed prayerfully with God's guidance. The Rule is not meant to be fixed, but flexible, and should be begun simply and reviewed regularly to accommodate her changing life circumstances and spiritual growth.

The Mary Magdalene Chapter of St. Paul's Episcopal Church has 42 senior members. We conducted a Discernment program and admitted one new Daughter in 2025. In 2025 we surrendered our Junior Daughters' Chapter Charter due to inactivity. We hope to reactivate the Chapter in the future.

Our Guild of the Christ Child continues to honor the parents of, and infants being baptized with a banner and sends cards on baptism anniversaries to each child. A photographic record book is kept of all baptized.

The Chapter sponsors scholarships for two students through Education = Hope in Haiti. The Chapter also provides items for the Little Free Pantry.

A Prayer List is maintained by Daughter Katie Faulkner and distributed regularly to all Chapter members. In addition, a prayer box and votive candle stand have been placed in the columbarium for visitors and parishioners to submit prayer requests and offer prayers. 

Pathfinders – Senior Adult Ministry (previously “Social Graces”)

Pathfinders is a ministry geared and designed mostly with people 55 years of age and older in mind. Under a new name, this ministry has expanded just a bit. This past year, even with limited space, Pathfinders was able to offer several programs and lunch gatherings. AgeWell will provide the congregation with 2 educational sessions along with resources including AgeWell's Directory of Services and caregiving guidebooks. Each congregation will also have 10 individual Eldercare Coach Consultations. Congregations determine how those consultations will be used. Those services are provided as confidential, personalized care support for caregivers.

These needlepoint kneelers were originally stitched by Betty Ann Baugh, long time member of St. Paul's, over 55 years ago.

There are many other enhancements we would like for our beautiful Nave. We have a "wish list" including, new cushions for the pews, new runner for center aisle and new carpet/rug for Narthex and Columbarium room.

Ongoing cataloguing of historic documents and photographs – a time consuming, costly task, but essential to preserve for future generations. Since the construction, we have been holding our monthly meetings at the Williamson County Archives. It has been inspiring to meet where our archives are housed.

The Education Committee – has taken advantage of being so "close" to our archives and has done much research this year and provided numerous interesting tidbits from our past.

Stephen Ministry is a lay-led pastoral ministry that provides one-to-one care for individuals experiencing grief, pain, transition, illness, loneliness, or any other hardship.

Mission and Services

Stephen Ministry at Saint Paul's continues to evolve and grow, as we move into our tenth year as a ministry. We serve not only our parishioners but also individuals beyond our church community. We offer a confidential listening ear, during times of hardship. We communicate through various methods to suit the care receiver's schedule and geographic location. Our primary goal is to help through listening, being present, and showing compassion and understanding. The Care Receiver's personal information and details of their difficulties are held in strict confidence. Our job is to walk beside you in your time of need and be there for you to listen, affirm and gently encourage healing.



Our Caregivers

Currently, we have 13 trained caregivers in our Stephen Ministry group. These dedicated individuals use their skills, gained through extensive training, to provide support. Skills such as listening, being assertive, and drawing out care receivers' concerns are central to our caregiving approach. We're especially grateful for Fred Warner who started the Stephen Ministry at St. Paul's and who trained us all, over the years.

Recycling at St. Paul's

The City of Franklin does not remove recycling for commercial business. Recycling and trash are combined into one pick-up. Several years ago, a number of people in the parish felt the need to formally begin recycling. They placed recycling bins throughout the Church buildings, requested the help of parishioners, and formally began a weekly pick-up. Now that the first phase of the construction is complete, recycling has been modified to meet the needs of the new construction.

We are always looking for volunteers. There is a good deal of cardboard boxes that are ready for removal by anyone who can take the time to recycle with your own things or deliver them to a recycling center. We encourage you to stop by and remove the cardboard as you leave the building.

We also have a weekly schedule. Currently we are looking for individuals/families to participate in a one day a month removal of the recycling. We have a calendar which has a schedule and explains the pick-up process. Or one of us on the team will meet you to talk and walk you through the process. There will be times when there are conflicts and for that reason, we have people who will substitute in your absence.

For those who are helping with the recycling, thank you. You are appreciated. We have several open spots on our schedule that we would like to fill. Lord's Lift ministry is a transportation system that offers rides to church on Sunday for people who, for whatever reason, are unable to transport themselves.

Provide our Parish administrator with your name, address, contact information, your preference of Sunday Service time, and if you use a walker or wheelchair. Holy Hikes – Middle Tennessee

- Vary in location each month - park, trail, zoo, etc.
- Are free unless the location of the hike charges an admission/fee.

We focused our efforts on Franklin Elementary School this year:


- Provided "Goodie Bags" including disinfecting wipes, paper towels, tissues for teachers and staff to help with back to school and flu season in January.


